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bodily function.

- (c) "Pediatric subacute care unit" means an identifiable unit of a certified nursing facility that is licensed as a skilled nursing facility under this chapter.
- (b) "Pediatric subacute patient" means a patient who is less than 21 years of age, is medically fragile, and requires special services, including, but not limited to, respiratory therapy; tracheostomy care, including, but not limited to, intravenous feeding; or complex wound management care.
- (d) "Subacute care" means a level of care required by a patient who does not require hospital acute care, but who requires more intensive licensed skilled nursing care than is provided to the majority of patients in a skilled nursing facility.
 - (2) A pediatric subacute care unit shall:
- (a) Accept and retain only patients for whom it can provide appropriate care pursuant to this section.
- (b) Provide a safe, clean, comfortable, and nurturing home-like environment designed to promote normal child development.
- (c) Serve patients based on age, gender, developmental level, and social needs in a manner designed to promote their growth and development.
- (d) Designate a resident care manager, whose staffing time equals one full-time position for every 20 patients. This position shall be dedicated to the pediatric subacute care unit

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and be separate from other nurse staffing hours required by the facility. The resident care manager shall be a registered nurse who possesses the knowledge and ability to assess and meet the current needs of each pediatric subacute patient. The resident care manager's responsibilities include, but are not limited to:

1. Coordinating patient admissions.

- 2. Acting as a liaison between the patient, family members, the interdisciplinary team, and the community to ensure that services to meet the patient's needs are initiated and delivered in accordance with an individualized plan of care and treatment.
- 3. Referring patients who qualify for special educational services pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. ss. 1400 et seq., early intervention programs, and special education programs offered under the Florida K-20 Education Code.
- 4. Coordinating with local and state agencies and programs that provide services to children.
 - 5. Coordinating patient and family education.
- 6. Preparing and implementing a discharge plan for each patient.
- 7. Organizing quarterly care plan meetings with the patient and the patient's parent or legal representative to determine the appropriate time for discharge to the least restrictive environment.
 - (e) Provide for a comprehensive developmental assessment

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for each pediatric subacute care patient who is under 36 months of age. The assessment shall be performed by a qualified professional with training and expertise specific to the assessment of, and program planning for, infant and child development. The professional who performs the developmental assessment shall:

- 1. Assess the patient's abilities and needs in at least the following areas, where applicable, within 14 calendar days after the patient is admitted to the pediatric subacute care unit:
- <u>a.</u> Sensorimotor development, including gross motor skills, fine motor skills, and visual motor perception.
 - b. Social development and cognitive development.
- c. Self-help development, including developmentally appropriate feeding, toileting, dressing, and grooming.
 - d. Language and communication skills.
 - e. Play and recreation needs.

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- 2. Prepare a developmental program for each patient with specific goals and activity plans to reach each goal.
- 3. Provide direct developmental services to patients in accordance with the developmental program.
- 4. Provide ongoing instruction to pediatric subacute direct patient care unit staff on the daily activities required to facilitate continuity of the developmental program.
- 5. Monitor the progress of the patient in reaching the goals of the developmental program, reassess the patient and

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revise the developmental program at least quarterly.

- 6. Maintain a record of the developmental program in the patient's medical chart, including regular progress notes.
 - 7. Participate in interdisciplinary team conferences.
- 8. Provide family education and advocacy to meet the medical and educational needs of the patient.
- 9. Make recommendations to the resident care manager regarding the provision of continuing developmental services before the patient is discharged to a lower level of care.
- (f) Incorporate each patient's developmental program into his or her comprehensive nursing care plan. The nursing care plan shall be revised based on changes in the developmental program.
- implement an individual education plan for each pediatric subacute care patient who is 36 months of age or older. The facility shall incorporate activities identified in the individual education plan, as appropriate, into the patient's comprehensive nursing care plan. To facilitate the continuity of educational goals, the local education agency shall instruct facility staff on strategies to incorporate individual education plan goals into after-school activities.
- (h) For each pediatric subacute patient who is under 36 months of age, incorporate activities identified in the individual family service plan, as appropriate, in the patient's comprehensive nursing plan. To facilitate continuity of

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services, the local education agency shall instruct facility staff on strategies to incorporate the goals of the individual family service plan in such activities.

- (i) Implement and maintain a system for determining patient requirements for nursing care based on patient needs with goals that are time limited, as provided in each patient's comprehensive care plan.
- (j) Maintain documentation of compliance with this section and provide such documentation to the agency upon request.
- (3) The agency shall adopt rules providing minimum staffing requirements for pediatric subacute care units. These requirements must include, for each unit:
- (a) Maintenance of a nursing staff level sufficient to ensure prompt recognition of any untoward change in patient condition and facilitate appropriate nursing, medical, or other intervention.
- (b) Designation of a head nurse, who shall be a registered nurse and shall manage the nursing staff of the unit. A head nurse must submit proof of completion of at least 10 continuing education units specific to the physical and psychosocial assessment of, and provision of care to, critically ill children within 1 year after the date of hire.
- (c) A minimum daily average of 7.0 actual, unduplicated licensed nursing hours per patient day, including 24 hours of registered nurse care, 1.5 hours of certified nursing assistant care per patient day, and 2.5 hours of respiratory care per

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patient day.

- (d) A minimum of one registered nurse per shift, not including the head nurse, unless at least 80 percent of the head nurse's time is spent in direct patient care. In such a case, the remaining 20 percent of the head nurse's time must be spent performing managerial duties.
- (4) Each licensed nurse employed in the unit shall provide evidence of an acquired competency, which shall be documented in the nurse's personnel records, including:
- (a) Proof of completion of at least 10 continuing education units specific to the provision of care to critically ill children, within 1 year after date of hire. These units are to be included in the continuing education total that is currently required and are not in addition to the continuing education requirement.
- (b) Proof of completion of at least 40 hours of direct practical experience and training in providing nursing services to the types of pediatric patients with technology dependency for whom the facility provides care, within 2 months after date of hire. The training must be provided by a registered nurse and may be provided during the licensed nurse's normal working hours.
- (c) Cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification. A registered nurse, a licensed practical nurse, or a respiratory therapist shall have upon date of hire, or shall obtain and subsequently maintain within 90 calendar days after date of

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hire, pediatric advanced cardiopulmonary resuscitation life
support certification.

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- (5) To serve as a nursing assistant in a pediatric subacute care unit, a person must be certified as a nursing assistant under part II of chapter 464, unless the person is a registered nurse or practical nurse licensed in accordance with part I of chapter 464 or an applicant for such licensure who is permitted to practice nursing in accordance with rules adopted by the Board of Nursing pursuant to part I of chapter 464.
- (6) A nurse who provides direct care and is assigned to the pediatric subacute care unit, including the head nurse, may not be assigned duties outside of the unit.
- (7) The agency, in collaboration with the Division of Children's Medical Services of the Department of Health, shall adopt rules for the operation of pediatric subacute care units.
