The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Thirteen

An Act relative to providing health education in schools.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- SECTION 1. Section 1D of chapter 69 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2008
 Official Edition, is hereby amended by inserting after the word "languages", in line 6, the words
- 3 "health education".

4 SECTION 2. Paragraph 3 of said section 1D of said chapter 69, as so appearing, is 5 hereby further amended by striking out the fourth sentence and inserting in place thereof the 6 following sentence:-

7 The standards for health education shall be age-appropriate, medically accurate and
8 shall, at minimum, provide for instruction in the following areas: growth and physical
9 development, physical activity and fitness, nutrition, reproduction and sexuality, mental health,
10 family life, interpersonal relationships, disease prevention and control, safety and injury

11 prevention, tobacco, alcohol, and other substance use and abuse prevention, consumer health and

12 resource management, ecological health, and community and public health.

SECTION 3. Consistent with the provisions of section 1E of said chapter 69, the
 Massachusetts Comprehensive Health Curriculum Framework shall be construed as a guide for

local school districts in the development and selection of curriculum, textbooks and instructionalmaterials.

17 SECTION 4. Paragraph 14 of section 1I of said chapter 69, as so appearing, is hereby 18 amended by adding the following clause:-

19 (1) health education.

20 SECTION 5. Consistent with the provisions of section 32A of chapter 71, every city,

21 town, regional school district or vocational school district implementing or maintaining

22 curriculum which primarily involves human sexual education or human sexuality issues shall

23 adopt a policy ensuring parental/guardian notification. Such policy shall afford parents or

24 guardians the flexibility to exempt their children from any portion of said curriculum through

25 written notification to the school principal. No child so exempted shall be penalized by reason of

26 such exemption. To the extent practicable, program instruction materials for said curriculum

27 shall be made reasonably accessible to parents, guardians, educators, school administrators, and

28 others for inspection and review.

29 SECTION 6. Nothing in this act shall be construed to require an MCAS exam on health 30 education.

31 SECTION 7. The foundation budget must be re-evaluated in the categories of (1) 32 classroom and specialist teachers, (2) instructional equipment, and (3) professional development 33 to ensure sufficient funding to provide the health education envisioned in the Frameworks and 34 Section 2 above.

35 SECTION 8. This act shall take effect on July 1, 2013.
