INTRODUCED AS NONCONTROVERSIAL RESOLUTION UNDER RULE 35, APRIL 7, 2014

A RESOLUTION

- Designating April 26, 2014, as "Take It All Back Day" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, Sexual violence and abuse can involve a range of
- 4 unacceptable behaviors, including rape, incest, molestation,
- 5 date and acquaintance rape, statutory rape, marital or partner
- 6 rape, ritual abuse, adult and child sexual exploitation, forced
- 7 prostitution, indecent sexual contact, sexual harassment,
- 8 exhibitionism, pornography, Internet-based child sexual abuse,
- 9 voyeurism and inappropriate touching; and
- 10 WHEREAS, One in four girls and one in six boys will become a
- 11 sexual assault victim by the age of 18 and 20% to 25% of college
- 12 women will experience attempted or completed rape during
- 13 college; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Friends and acquaintances commit between 80% and 90%
- 15 of the sexual assaults against women on college campuses; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Adults commit most sexual abuse incidents against
- 2 children, with adults comprising 77% of the perpetrators and
- 3 juveniles making up 23%, and most child victims of sexual abuse
- 4 know a perpetrator before an incident; and
- 5 WHEREAS, In the United States, more than 800,000 adult women
- 6 and 110,000 adult men yearly face the traumatic experience of
- 7 rape while an unknown number survive other forms of sexual
- 8 violence and abuse; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Victims of sexual violence will more than likely
- 10 experience long-term mental health consequences, including
- 11 suicide and attempted suicide, eating disorders, substance
- 12 abuse, promiscuity, low self-esteem, psychiatric
- 13 hospitalizations and posttraumatic stress disorder; and
- 14 WHEREAS, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has
- 15 identified sexual violence as an urgent and costly public health
- 16 crisis, and the American Medical Association has stated that
- 17 sexual violence serves as a silent, violent epidemic that grows
- 18 at alarming rates and traumatizes women, men and children of
- 19 this nation; and
- 20 WHEREAS, The Federal Bureau of Investigation and other law
- 21 enforcement agencies nationwide indicate that sexual violence is
- 22 the most underreported crime, with only an average of 31% of
- 23 rape and sexual assault incidents being reported to the police;
- 24 and
- 25 WHEREAS, April serves as Sexual Assault Awareness Month,
- 26 which is intended to draw attention to the fact that sexual
- 27 violence is widespread and has public health implications for
- 28 every resident in Pennsylvania; and
- 29 WHEREAS, Residents throughout this Commonwealth can work
- 30 together to prevent sexual assault and to support survivors; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Groups such as WOAR, formerly known as Women
- 2 Organized Against Rape, and the Pennsylvania Coalition Against
- 3 Rape (PCAR) have a history of working to stop sexual violence
- 4 and abuse; and
- 5 WHEREAS, WOAR was organized in Philadelphia in 1971 and
- 6 incorporated in 1973 as the first rape crisis center in
- 7 Pennsylvania and the United States and has worked toward
- 8 eliminating all forms of sexual violence and has advocated for
- 9 the rights of victims of sexual assault and abuse through a
- 10 comprehensive array of services for adult and child survivors of
- 11 sexual assault, their family members and communities across
- 12 Philadelphia; and
- 13 WHEREAS, PCAR was formed in 1975 and works to eliminate all
- 14 forms of sexual violence and to advocate for the rights and
- 15 needs of victims of sexual assault by challenging public
- 16 attitudes, raising public awareness and effecting critical
- 17 changes in public policy, protocols and responses to sexual
- 18 violence; and
- 19 WHEREAS, PCAR and the National Sexual Violence Resource
- 20 Center have officially observed April as National Sexual Assault
- 21 Awareness Month since 2001 and continue to organize events for
- 22 the observance and education of the public about the problems of
- 23 sexual violence and abuse and the need for action to stop and
- 24 prevent them; and
- 25 WHEREAS, WOAR has raised its voice to inform and spur the
- 26 public to action, including through the sponsorship of the Ninth
- 27 Annual "Take It All Back" Community Walk along Market Street in
- 28 Philadelphia on Saturday, April 26, 2014, starting at 11:30 a.m.
- 29 at Love Park and continuing with speakers and other activities
- 30 until 3 p.m. at the Independence Visitor Center to raise

- 1 awareness about sexual violence; therefore be it
- 2 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate
- 3 April 26, 2014, as "Take It All Back Day" in Pennsylvania and
- 4 urge all its members and all residents of this Commonwealth to
- 5 join together with groups such as WOAR and PCAR in events such
- 6 as the "Take It All Back" Community Walk and their efforts
- 7 during National Sexual Assault Awareness Month in April and
- 8 throughout the year to work on behalf of victims of sexual
- 9 violence to educate individuals in preventing sexual violence
- 10 and eliminate sexual crimes in our community; and be it further
- 11 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize WOAR
- 12 and PCAR and other similar groups for their efforts to stop and
- 13 prevent sexual violence and abuse in all forms and to assist the
- 14 survivors of such incidents and honor both groups and others for
- 15 events such as the "Take It All Back" Community Walk on
- 16 April 26, 2014, that will educate and inform the public about
- 17 such incidents and help support survivors of such incidents.
