A RESOLUTION

- 1 Recognizing April 26, 2014, as "Pretzel Day" in Pennsylvania.
- 2 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania is known as the Snack Food Capital of
- 3 the World, with snack food and confectionery companies, large
- 4 and small, generating more than \$5.1 billion in sales annually;
- 5 and
- 6 WHEREAS, The production of pretzels represents a large
- 7 portion of these sales, and it is estimated that this
- 8 Commonwealth's pretzel bakeries provide about 80% of America's
- 9 supply of this delicious, twisty treat; and
- 10 WHEREAS, According to various sources, pretzels were created
- 11 by monks in the 7th century A.D. by forming scraps of dough to
- 12 represent a child's arms folded in prayer; and
- 13 WHEREAS, More than 1,000 years later the tradition of
- 14 pretzel-baking was brought to Pennsylvania by German-speaking

- 1 immigrants; and
- 2 WHEREAS, America's first commercial pretzel bakery was
- 3 founded in 1861 in Lititz, Lancaster County, when Julius Sturgis ◀
- 4 started selling pretzels with a recipe and methods that are used
- 5 by his descendants today; and
- 6 WHEREAS, National Pretzel Day was initially declared in 1983
- 7 by United States Representative Robert S. Walker of Lancaster
- 8 County, Pennsylvania, who proclaimed that his favorite food
- 9 deserved a holiday; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Former Pennsylvania Governor Ed Rendell redeclared
- 11 the holiday in 2003 to acknowledge the importance of the pretzel
- 12 to this Commonwealth's history and economy; therefore be it
- 13 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize April
- 14 26, 2014, as "Pretzel Day" in Pennsylvania.
