## A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing June 26, 2014, as the one-year anniversary of the United States Supreme Court decisions leading to the freedom to marry for gay couples in Pennsylvania. 3
- WHEREAS, On June 26, 2013, the United States Supreme Court 4
- 5 struck down section 3 of the Defense of Marriage Act of 1996
- (Public Law 104-199, 1 U.S.C. § 7), which denied legally married 6
- 7 same-sex couples over 1,100 protections and responsibilities of
- marriage; and 8
- 9 WHEREAS, The United States Supreme Court has affirmed that
- all loving and committed couples who marry deserve equal legal 10
- 11 respect and treatment; and
- 12 WHEREAS, United States District Court Judge John E. Jones III
- struck down Pennsylvania's ban on same-sex marriage on May 20, 13
- 14 2014; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The struggle for equality among lesbian, gay,
- bisexual and transgender people is the modern face of the Civil 16
- Rights Movement; and 17
- 18 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania has often been a proud leader in

- 1 recognizing basic human rights and in fighting against
- 2 discrimination; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania law requires that equal rights shall
- 4 not be denied on account of the sex of any person; therefore be
- 5 it
- 6 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives support the
- 7 continued fight for equality for all people by recognizing the
- 8 need to extend equal protections in employment, housing and
- 9 public accommodations to everyone, regardless of sexual
- 10 orientation, gender identity or expression; and be it further
- 11 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives commemorate the
- 12 right of gay couples to marry in this Commonwealth and across
- 13 the United States on the one-year anniversary of the United
- 14 States Supreme Court decisions in the freedom-to-marry cases and
- 15 in recognition of the removal of the Commonwealth's ban on same-
- 16 sex marriage, which ended the two-tiered system of marriage and
- 17 provided additional legal protections to same-sex couples.
