AN ACT

- To direct the Secretary of Homeland Security to train Department of Homeland Security personnel how to effectively deter, detect, disrupt, and prevent human trafficking during the course of their primary roles and responsibilities, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Human Trafficking3 Detection Act of 2014".

4 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

5 In this Act:

6 (1) DEPARTMENT.—The term "Department"
7 means the Department of Homeland Security.

8 (2) HUMAN TRAFFICKING.—The term "human 9 trafficking" means an act or practice described in 10 paragraph (9) or (10) of section 103 of the Traf-11 ficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (22 U.S.C. 12 7102).

13 (3) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary" means
14 the Secretary of Homeland Security.

15 SEC. 3. TRAINING FOR DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL TO IDEN-16 TIFY HUMAN TRAFFICKING.

17 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
18 date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall imple19 ment a program to—

20 train and periodically retrain relevant (1)21 Transportation Security Administration, U.S. Cus-22 toms and Border Protection, and other Department 23 personnel that the Secretary considers appropriate, 24 how to effectively deter, detect, and disrupt human 25 trafficking, and, where appropriate, interdict a sus-26 pected perpetrator of human trafficking, during the •HR 5116 EH

course of their primary roles and responsibilities;
 and

(2) ensure that the personnel referred to in 3 4 paragraph (1) regularly receive current information 5 on matters related to the detection of human traf-6 ficking, including information that becomes available 7 outside of the Department's initial or periodic re-8 training schedule, to the extent relevant to their offi-9 cial duties and consistent with applicable informa-10 tion and privacy laws.

(b) TRAINING DESCRIBED.—The training referred to
in subsection (a) may be conducted through in-class or
virtual learning capabilities, and shall include—

14 (1) methods for identifying suspected victims of
15 human trafficking and, where appropriate, perpetra16 tors of human trafficking;

17 (2) for appropriate personnel, methods to ap18 proach a suspected victim of human trafficking,
19 where appropriate, in a manner that is sensitive to
20 the suspected victim and is not likely to alert a sus21 pected perpetrator of human trafficking;

(3) training that is most appropriate for a particular location or environment in which the personnel receiving such training perform their official
duties;

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(4) other topics determined by the Secretary to
 be appropriate; and

3 (5) a post-training evaluation for personnel re-4 ceiving the training.

5 (c) TRAINING CURRICULUM REVIEW.—The Secretary
6 shall annually reassess the training program established
7 under subsection (a) to ensure it is consistent with current
8 techniques, patterns, and trends associated with human
9 trafficking.

10 SEC. 4. CERTIFICATION AND REPORT TO CONGRESS.

(a) CERTIFICATION.—Not later than one year after
the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall
certify to the appropriate congressional committees that
all personnel referred to in section 3(a) have successfully
completed the training required under that section.

16 (b) REPORT TO CONGRESS.—Not later than one year after the date of the enactment of this Act and annually 17 18 thereafter, the Secretary shall report to the appropriate 19 congressional committees the overall effectiveness of the program required by this Act, the number of cases re-20 21 ported by Department personnel in which human traf-22 ficking was suspected and, of those cases, the number of 23 cases that were confirmed cases of such trafficking.

1 SEC. 5. ASSISTANCE TO NON-FEDERAL ENTITIES.

2 The Secretary may provide training curricula to any
3 State, local, or tribal government or private organization
4 to assist such entity in establishing its program of training
5 to identify human trafficking, upon request from such en6 tity.
