22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
23	Section 1. There is hereby appropriated for the
24	support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year
25	ending September 30, 2022, for debt service, and for capital
26	outlay to be paid out of funds specified in subsection (a) of
27	Section 2 of this act, the amounts specified in subsections

(a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) of Section 3 of this act. For the 1 2 purpose specified in subsection (b) of Section 2 of this act, amounts are shown by programmatic area and the total for all 3 programs is shown so as to include estimated sources of funds 4 other than those listed in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this 5 act. For the purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the 6 Education Trust Fund and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean 7 all gifts, grants, contributions, or entitlements, including 8 9 grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or 10 counties.

Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in 11 this act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the 12 13 credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund, 14 15 Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education Catastrophic Fund, Public School Fund and other listed funds 16 17 and are hereby made for the support of public education in 18 Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022, and the appropriations herein made shall be subject to the provisions, 19 20 terms, conditions and limitations of the Budget and Financial 21 Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), 22 the provisions of the Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the 23 24 amounts hereinafter specified.

(b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Earmarked
Funds" and "Appropriation Total" are as set forth for the
purpose of establishing amounts estimated to be available by

For "Fringe Benefits" the rate per day for two personal days and five sick days (for units earned in the Foundation Program) shall be \$95. The Teachers' Retirement System employer rate shall be 12.43% of salaries for Tier I members and 11.32% of salaries for Tier II members. The Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Program (PEEHIP) rate shall be \$800 per month for each full-time employee. As funds are appropriated, the appropriation herein shall include funds to pay for substitute support employees for each day a support employee is absent.

For "Classroom Instructional Support," the uniform amounts used in determining the Foundation Program allowance for classroom instructional support shall be: (1) textbooks or digital resources at \$75.00 per pupil in average daily membership during the first 20 scholastic days after Labor Day of the preceding school year; (2) classroom materials and supplies at \$1,000.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (3) technology at \$400.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (4) professional development at \$100.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; and (5) library enhancement at \$157.72 per unit earned in the Foundation Program. Funds allocated for instructional support units to meet Advanced Education standards may be used for principals, assistant principals, counselors, and librarians as calculated by the State Department of Education and assigned to the schools where such units are earned. An instructional support unit earned for a principal shall be increased by .31 for elementary schools, .35 for middle schools, and .45 for secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for an assistant principal shall be increased by .10 for elementary schools, middle schools, secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for a counselor shall be increased by .03 for secondary schools and unit schools. The budgeting and expenditure of funds in the Foundation Program at the local level shall be determined and made by the local board of education in accordance with rules and regulations of the State Board of Education and all laws governing such school budgets and expenditures.

30 Section 4. In addition to the appropriations herein 31 made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or 32 entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act, 33 including grants by the Congress of the United States,

municipalities or counties, to any department, division, 1 2 board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and, 3 in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to 4 5 such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, 6 institution, office or officer to be used only for the purpose 7 or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or shall be made. Further, all state, county, municipal and educational 8 entities are authorized to disburse such sums as deemed 9 10 necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of Public Accounts 11 12 to partially defray the cost of auditing services performed by 13 said agency. All such sums are hereby appropriated and reappropriated if necessary to the Department of Examiners of 14 15 Public Accounts for audit services, to be expended through the fund established by Section 41-5A-22, Code of Alabama 1975. 16

17 Section 5. The State Superintendent of Education 18 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules 19 20 and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of 21 any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of 22 Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, whereupon the Comptroller shall issue her warrant therefor. 23 24 All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the 25 manner now provided by law. 26

Section 6. Nothing in this act shall be construed to 1 2 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution 3 of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 4 5 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income 6 therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to 7 receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or 8 institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will 9 10 show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision of this appropriation. 11

Section 7. The appropriations made herein to the 12 13 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 14 include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards, 15 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 16 17 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the 18 fiscal year ending September 30, 2022. All agencies and institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from 19 20 other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the 21 general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such 22 23 services.

24 Section 8. All encumbered balances of a previous 25 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized 26 by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no 27 later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations were made.

Section 9. Upon certification to the Director of 5 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has 6 7 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby 8 9 appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or 10 commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other 11 appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this 12 13 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon 14 the availability of funds and a determination by the Director 15 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available 16 for court-ordered payments.

17 Section 10. Local boards of education may exercise 18 flexibility among line item expenditures, not to create a 19 reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board of 20 education support personnel.

21 Section 11. The State Superintendent of Education 22 may approve a request by a local board of education for 23 redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for 24 pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition 25 Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child 26 Nutrition Program of that local board of education from 27 maintaining a one-month fund balance. 1 Section 12. The appropriations made herein to the 2 departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include the amounts necessary to pay the State Employees' Insurance 3 Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$930 per month for each 4 5 full-time employee for the fiscal year ending September 30, 6 2022. The State Employees' Insurance Board will adjust the 7 insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the aforementioned fixed rate. 8

Section 13. Notwithstanding any other provisions of 9 10 this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021 to the various state 11 agencies and institutions in this act, including 12 13 appropriations from the Education Trust Fund, which are 14 unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2021 are hereby 15 reappropriated to the respective state agencies, offices and 16 institutions for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2021.

17 Section 14. (a) The At-Risk and High Hopes 18 appropriations made to the State Department of Education shall be expended as follows: 50% shall be at the discretion of the 19 20 State Superintendent of Education and 50% shall be awarded in 21 the form of grants to school systems/entities for activities 22 or programs designed to enhance outcomes for At-Risk Students. At-Risk Students shall be defined as students who have not met 23 24 proficiency standards for state accountability assessments and one or more of the following apply: the student attends a 25 26 Title I school; qualifies for free or reduced lunch; qualifies for special education or Tier III intervention; or is an 27

1 English language learner. In the awarding of grants, 2 preference will be given to undertakings that will directly impact student achievement and improve performance on state 3 assessments to include remediation for students, after-school 4 5 and tutorial programs, career/technical programs, character education, enrichment activities, programs that enhance 6 7 reading and mathematics abilities in students, activities that 8 increase grade-to-grade promotion, career and college 9 readiness and early warning and prevention programs. Programs 10 must employ evidence-based practices and measure student growth and achievement using research-based norms and 11 12 criterion. Funds should be awarded on a per-pupil basis, with 13 no more than ten percent of the grant award going toward 14 personnel costs.

15 (b) In an effort to provide the best and most efficient implementation for intervention and innovation in 16 17 schools, administration of the grant awards shall be assigned 18 to the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and Financial Support with evaluative input 19 20 from other Alabama State Department of Education advisory 21 personnel, including the State Superintendent of Education, as appropriate. The grant application process must require 22 23 districts to submit plans to the Alabama State Department of 24 Education detailing their intended use of the grant funds with 25 regard to student proficiency and growth. Grants may be 26 awarded any time after July 1st so schools can prepare for the 27 new school year. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Alabama

1 State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and 2 Financial Support shall make every reasonable effort to notify 3 grant recipients of awards by August 1, 2021. No funding will 4 be available until October 1, 2021. Grantees will have no 5 guarantee of funding until October 1, 2021.

6 (c) Upon the awarding of any grant funds, the 7 Alabama State Department of Education must submit a report to 8 the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education Committee and the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education and the 9 10 Deputy Director of the Legislative Services Agency-Fiscal Division, that shall indicate the grant-recipient districts 11 and each district's plan for those funds. Those districts 12 13 shall submit follow-up reports indicating the results of those plans from the previous school year by July 31, 2022. 14

15 Section 15. All nongovernmental entities, identified by the Legislative Services Agency, which are allocated funds 16 17 in Section 3 of this act shall file a report with the Chairs 18 of the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education, and the Deputy 19 20 Director of the Legislative Services Agency-Fiscal Division 21 regarding the proposed expenditures and usage of the funds 22 appropriated in the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022.

23 Section 16. If any section, paragraph, sentence, 24 clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion 25 of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or 26 invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, 27 sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof
hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid.
Section 17. All laws or parts of laws, general,
special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent
with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.
Section 18. This act shall become effective on
October 1, 2021.
