(a) By January 1, 2021, the Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training Commission shall provide not less than 16 hours of instruction relating to Mental Health 9 10 Awareness, which incorporates the concepts of crisis intervention, as part of the curriculum of training required 11 under Section 36-21-46, Code of Alabama 1975, to all law 12 13 enforcement trainees within the commission's jurisdiction. (b) A law enforcement officer certified by the 14 15 commission prior to January 1, 2021, shall complete the Mental Health Awareness program required under subsection (a) by 16

- (c) The commission shall annually review and update the training to include changes and trends in mental health awareness for first responders.
- (d) The commission may adopt rules for the implementation and administration of this act.
