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20	Relating to education; to amend Section 16-40A-2,
21	Code of Alabama 1975, to revise the curriculum of sexual
22	health education in public schools.
23	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
24	Section 1. Section 16-40A-2, Code of Alabama 1975,
25	is amended to read as follows:
26	"§16-40A-2.

"(a) Any program or curriculum in the public schools
in Alabama that includes sex education or the human
reproductive process shall, as a minimum, include and
emphasize the following:

"(1) Abstinence from sexual intercourse sex is the
only completely effective protection against unwanted
<u>unintended</u> pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases
<u>infections</u>, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS)
human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) when transmitted sexually.

10 "(2) Abstinence from sexual intercourse sex outside 11 of lawful marriage is the expected social standard for 12 unmarried school-age persons.

"(b) Course materials and instruction that relate to
 sexual <u>health</u> education or sexually transmitted diseases
 <u>infections</u> should be age-appropriate, <u>medically accurate</u>, <u>and</u>
 <u>culturally appropriate</u>.

"(c) Course materials and instruction that relate to
 sexual <u>health</u> education or sexually transmitted diseases
 <u>infections</u> should include all of the following elements:

"(1) An emphasis on sexual abstinence as the only
 completely reliable method of avoiding unwanted <u>unintended</u>
 teenage pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases
 infections.

"(2) An emphasis on the importance of self-control
 and ethical conduct pertaining to delaying sexual activity and
 discouraging risky sexual behavior.

"(3) Statistics based on the latest medical
information that indicate the degree of reliability and
unreliability of various forms of contraception, while also
emphasizing the increase in protection against pregnancy and
protection against sexually transmitted diseases infections,
including HIV and AIDS infection, which is afforded by the use
of various contraceptive measures.

8 "(4) Information concerning the laws relating to the 9 financial responsibilities associated with pregnancy, 10 childbirth, and child rearing.

"(5) Information concerning the laws prohibiting sexual abuse, the need to report such abuse, and the legal options available to victims of sexual abuse.

14 "(6) Information on how to cope with and rebuff 15 unwanted physical and verbal sexual exploitation by other 16 persons.

17 "(7) Psychologically sound methods of resisting18 unwanted peer pressure.

19 "(8) An emphasis, in a factual manner and from a
20 public health perspective, that homosexuality is not a
21 lifestyle acceptable to the general public and that homosexual
22 conduct is a criminal offense under the laws of the state.

23 "(9) (8) Comprehensive instruction in parenting 24 skills and responsibilities, including the responsibility to 25 pay child support by non-custodial parents, the penalties for 26 non-payment of child support, and the legal and ethical 27 responsibilities of child care and child rearing." Section 2. This act shall become effective on the
 first day of the third month following its passage and
 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
