1 173286-1:n:02/02/2016:MCS/tj LRS2016-275 2 3 4 5 6 7 URGING CONGRESS TO AMEND THE REFUGEE ACT OF 1980 AND 8 TO ENACT LEGISLATION TO STRENGTHEN REFUGEE VETTING AND 9 10 RESETTLEMENT. 11 12 WHEREAS, since 2011, armed and doctrinal conflict in 13 the Syrian Arab Republic has caused the displacement of millions of Syrian nationals; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the President of the United States has 16 recently announced a policy initiative to admit 10,000 Syrian 17 refugees in fiscal year 2016; and 18 WHEREAS, on Friday, November 13, 2015, more than 120 19 people were killed and 350 others wounded in a coordinated series of terrorist attacks in Paris, France; and 20 21 WHEREAS, these attacks were conducted by Islamic 22 extremists, at least one of them a recent Syrian refugee, and 23 the radical terrorist group, Islamic State (ISIS), claimed 24 responsibility; and

WHEREAS, subsequent to these attacks, additional
 terrorist attacks have been committed or attempted by
 terrorists posing as refugees; and

WHEREAS, it is reasonably possible that members of 4 the Islamic States of Iran, Iraq, and Syria, or another 5 6 radical extremist terrorist organization, may seek to exploit 7 the historical policy of the United States in welcoming refugees in our borders by claiming refugee status as a means 8 9 to enter and infiltrate the country for the unlawful purpose of committing terrorist acts and harming U.S. citizens and 10 11 property; and

12 WHEREAS, current databases do not allow for 13 meaningful advanced screening of Syrian refugees, as 14 demonstrated by the Director of the FBI, who testified to 15 Congress that the federal government does not have the 16 necessary background information to effectively conduct 17 security checks on Syrian nationals; and

18 WHEREAS, the infiltration of radical terrorist 19 organizations in the refugee process could result in a threat 20 to the life, safety, and property of American citizens and the 21 United States; and

22 WHEREAS, when the threat to United States citizens 23 is foreseeable, it is prudent to implement common sense and 24 precautionary measures, as well as to strengthen our state and 25 federal laws, to prevent the occurrence of an emergency which threatens the life, safety, and property of American citizens;
and

WHEREAS, changes in federal law, including the 3 Refugee Resettlement Act of 1980, as amended, to strengthen 4 the refugee vetting process, to mandate meaningful advance 5 security and health screenings of refugees prior to 6 7 resettlement in the states, or other security measures, including follow-up monitoring of resettled refugees, as well 8 9 as to provide for the substantive involvement of the states in the refugee resettlement process, both in advance of and upon 10 11 arrival, are necessary to provide for the safety and 12 protection of United States citizens; and

13 WHEREAS, until there is a verifiable means to vet 14 refugees and certify the results, the states should be 15 authorized and empowered to reject refugees until adequate 16 vetting and certification is complete; now therefore,

17 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH 18 HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That by copy of this resolution, the United States Congress and the President are urged to 19 20 amend the Refugee Resettlement Act of 1980 and pass federal 21 legislation to mandate meaningful advance security and health 22 screenings of refugees prior to resettlement in the states, or 23 other security measures, including follow-up monitoring of resettled refugees, as well as to provide for the substantive 24 25 involvement of the states in the refugee resettlement process,

both in advance of and upon arrival, in order to provide for
 the safety and protection of United States citizens.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the United States Congress and the President are urged to enact legislation authorizing and empowering the United States and its states to reject refugees from resettlement in the event that, for any reason, the vetting process for a refugee is not adequately and completely conducted.

9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That duly authenticated 10 copies of this resolution be provided to the President of the 11 United States, to United States Secretary of Homeland 12 Security, the Director of the United States Citizenship and 13 Immigration Services, the Speaker and Clerk of the United 14 States House of Representatives, and the President Pro Tempore 15 and the Secretary of the United States Senate.
