8 RECOGNIZING THE FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF THE DEVASTATING
9 TORNADOS OF APRIL 27, 2011, AND COMMENDING THE OUTSTANDING

WHEREAS, in recognition of observing the first anniversary of the unprecedented tornadoes that ravaged our state, it is appropriate to honor all the first responders -- paid and volunteer firefighters and medics, law enforcement personnel, and city work crews -- as well as the church groups, civic organizations, and private citizens whose actions saved countless Alabamians and thereby kept the loss of life statewide to no more than the number recorded, a tragic toll exceeding 247 that could have been worse; and

WHEREAS, on April 27, 2011, the EF5 tornado that devastated Alabama reached wind peaks in excess of 210 miles per hour and carved a path more than 1.25 miles wide, resulting in the worst natural disaster ever to hit the State of Alabama and one of the most destructive tornadoes in United States history; and

WHEREAS, with first responders setting the pace, the people of Alabama came together to rescue victims, to secure homes and businesses, to salvage properties, and to begin the overwhelming task of attempting to restore the shattered communities to a sense of normalcy; and

WHEREAS, volunteers followed the lead of our exceptionally competent professionals, donating countless hours of service and creating a spirit not just of survival but of revitalization; as the days passed, in addition to neighbors helping neighbors, the kindness of strangers became a reality, providing an unexpected dimension to the values of faith, family, and community that traditionally sustain us; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That no words can convey the depth of gratitude owed to our first responders and to all the selfless, tireless individuals who worked together toward recovery, but it is nevertheless in highest tribute to them that we hereby recognize the first anniversary of the April 27, 2011, tornado outbreak that devastated the State of Alabama.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be provided for appropriate display, as evidence of the admiration and appreciation of the people of the State of Alabama for our valiant firefighters, medics, and law enforcement personnel.
