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11	WHEREAS, of the estimated 5.5 million Americans
12	living with Alzheimers dementia in 2017, an estimated 5.3
13	million are age 65 and older and approximately 200,000
14	individuals are under the age of 65 and have younger-onset
15	Alzheimer's; and
16	WHEREAS, Alzheimer's dementia is the sixth-leading
17	cause of death in the United States and is the only cause of
18	death of the top 10 that cannot be prevented, cured or, even
19	slowed; and
20	WHEREAS, as Alzheimer's dementia progresses,
21	individuals may experience changes in personality and
22	behavior, anxiety, suspiciousness, or agitation, as well as
23	delusions or hallucinations, and may lose their ability to
24	recognize familiar places and faces, remember their names or
25	addresses, and may unknowingly place themselves and others in
26	dangerous situations; and

WHEREAS, emergency medical service providers, law enforcement officers, and firefighters are called upon to respond to or interact with persons displaying behaviors associated with dementia under a variety of everyday circumstances and must be prepared to handle the challenges facing their citizens with dementia; and

WHEREAS, effective ways to mitigate an encounter between emergency medical service providers, law enforcement officers, or firefighters and a person living with Alzheimer's dementia includes recognizing the signs of dementia disease, learning best practices in approaching and communicating with persons who have dementia, and being aware of situations where an emergency medical provider, law enforcement officer, or firefighter might encounter individuals with dementia along with effective ways to respond during those interactions; and

WHEREAS, Alzheimer's disease and related dementia awareness training provides emergency medical service providers, law enforcement officers, and firefighters with effective response options; and

WHEREAS, the Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training Commission (APOSTC), the Alabama Department of Public Health Office of Emergency Medical Services (ADPH-OEMS), and the Alabama Fire College and Personnel Standards Commission (AFCPSC) recognizes that their members could increase their awareness and response options through training on Alzheimer's disease or related dementia; and

WHEREAS, APOSTC, ADPH-OEMS, and AFCPSC develop and implement the training curriculum for emergency medical service providers, law enforcement officers, and firefighters in their prospective training academies and has expressed a willingness to add Alzheimer's disease and related dementia awareness as an element of the basic training curriculum for all newly certified emergency medical service providers, law enforcement officers, and firefighters; and

WHEREAS, APOSTC, ADHP-OEMS, and AFCPSC consider
Alzheimer's disease and related dementia awareness important
to the training of emergency medical service providers, law
enforcement officers, firefighters and desire to promote
additional training of those in the field to ensure safety of
all persons; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF
THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING,
That the Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training
Commission, the Alabama Department of Public Health Office of
Emergency Medical Services and the Alabama Fire College
Personnel Standards Commission are congratulated on their
willingness to recognize the importance and value of
Alzheimer's disease and related dementia awareness training;
and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Alzheimer's disease and related dementia awareness training that will help emergency medical providers, law enforcement, and firefighters gain a better understanding of common behaviors, learn strategies and

tactics for successful interactions, and more effectively and
efficiently respond to common calls involving a person with
Alzheimer's disease or another dementia may be included as an
element of the basic academy certification training and made
available for in-service training or as a part of annual

6 continuing education requirements.
