10	WHEREAS, it is with immense pride and pleasure that
11	we recognize Black History Month in February and National
12	Women's History Month in March each year; at the convergence
13	of these two months, we take the time for providing historical
14	information and noting the importance of the preservation of
15	the African-American culture and of all women in our society;
16	it is a fitting time to recognize and commend the Black women
17	enslaved and used in medical experiments; these women, mostly
18	unnamed, are known as the Mothers of Gynecology; three named
19	African-American slaves are Anarcha, Lucy, and Betsey; and
20	WHEREAS, recognizing the selfless and monumental
21	contributions and accomplishments of all African-Americans and
22	of all women, as well as emphasizing the importance of
23	historic preservation as a tool for understanding American
24	history, is appropriate during this time; and
25	WHEREAS, invisible in the shadow of Dr. James Marion
26	Sims, who practiced medicine in Montgomery, Alabama, and is

known as the Father of Modern Gynecology, were the

African-American female slaves, who were forced, without anesthesia, to be subjected to experimental surgeries; named in the writings of Dr. Sims were Anarcha, Lucy, and Betsey; we recognize them for their role in the creation of modern women's health and for the advancement in medicine that came as a result of their courage and perserverance; these brave women are symbols of all of the enslaved and vulnerable populations that have been exploited under the guise of medical advancement; highest commendations and honor are hereby extended to these enslaved women; and

WHEREAS, Anarcha, Lucy, Betsey, and their sister slaves certainly are the unsung heros, the Mothers of Modern Gynecology; they had a part in furthering the health of women of all races and a part in the success of Dr. Sims, who honed and perfected his craft with the development of instruments that are very close to what is still used today; his success rests solely on the personal sacrifice of these courageous, enslaved African-American women that were subjected to his experiments; and

WHEREAS, these enslaved women have earned our respect for their exceptional sacrifice and personal contributions and are truly deserving of special recognition; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That we extend sincere and heartfelt gratitude to these women who suffered through extreme measures and have championed the cause for
