becoming effective with regard to a local governmental entity without enactment by a 2/3 vote unless: it comes within one of a number of specified exceptions; it is approved by the affected entity; or the Legislature appropriates funds, or provides a local source of revenue, to the entity for the purpose.

8 The purpose or effect of this bill would be 9 to require a new or increased expenditure of local 10 funds within the meaning of the amendment. However, 11 the bill does not require approval of a local 12 governmental entity or enactment by a 2/3 vote to 13 become effective because it comes within one of the 14 specified exceptions contained in the amendment.

20 To amend Sections 21-7-1 to 21-7-9, inclusive, Code 21 of Alabama 1975, relating to the use of service animals; to 22 provide for the rights and responsibilities of an individual with a disability who uses a service animal in a public 23 24 accommodation or a housing accommodation; to provide criminal 25 penalties for a person who misrepresents the use of a service 26 animal or as a trainer and for denying or interfering with the right of an individual with a disability to use a service 27

animal or the trainer of a service animal to have a service 1 2 animal in a public accommodation under certain conditions; and 3 in connection therewith to have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds 4 5 within the meaning of Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the 6 7 Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, 8 as amended. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 9 10 Section 1. Sections 21-7-1 to 21-7-9, inclusive, Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows: 11 "§21-7-1. 12 13 "It is the policy of this state to encourage and 14 enable the blind, the visually handicapped, and the otherwise 15 physically disabled to participate fully in the social and 16 economic life of the state and to engage in remunerative 17 employment. 18 "(a) For the purposes of this act, the following 19 terms shall have the following meanings: 20 "(1) HANDLER. Includes an individual with a 21 disability and a trainer. 22 "(2) HOUSING ACCOMMODATION. Any real property or portion thereof which is used or occupied, or intended, 23 24 arranged, or designed to be used or occupied, as the home, 25 residence, or sleeping place of one or more persons, but may not include any single-family residence, the occupants of 26

1	which rent, lease, or furnish for compensation not more than
2	one room therein.
3	"(3) INDIVIDUAL WITH A DISABILITY. A person who has
4	a physical or mental impairment, including a physical,
5	sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental

8	"(4) MAJOR LIFE ACTIVITY. A function such as caring
9	for one's self, performing manual tasks, walking, seeing,

12 "(a) For the purposes of this section, the term 13 service animal means any dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with 14 15 a disability.

"(b) Every person with a disability, including a 16 17 person who is totally or partially blind, hearing-impaired, or 18 diagnosed on the autism spectrum shall have (a) An individual 19 with a disability has the right to be accompanied by a service 20 animal in any public place all areas of a public 21 accommodation, including a public or private school, and any of the places listed in Section 21-7-3 that the public or 22 23 customers are normally permitted to occupy. spectrum, any aide assigned to assist the child minor shall be
trained with the service animal in basic commands in order to
assist the child minor as a team.

9 "(f) This section does not relieve a person
10 accompanied by a service animal from liability for any damages
11 done to the premises or facilities by the service animal. An
12 individual with a disability is liable for damage caused by a
13 service animal if it is the regular policy and practice of the
14 public accommodation to charge a person who is not disabled
15 for damages caused by a pet.

16 "(g) The care or supervision of a service animal is 17 the responsibility of the individual owner of the service 18 animal.

"(1) A public accommodation may not be required to 19 20 provide care or food or a special location for a service 21 animal or assistance with removing animal excrement. 22 "(2) A public accommodation may exclude or remove an animal from the premises, including a service animal, if the 23 24 animal is out of control and the handler of the animal does 25 not take effective action to control the animal, the animal is not housebroken, or the behavior of the animal poses a direct 26 27 threat to the health and safety of others.

9 "It is the policy of this state that the blind, the 10 visually handicapped, and the otherwise physically disabled an individual with a disability shall be employed in the state 11 12 service, the service of the political subdivisions of the 13 state, in the public schools, and in all other employment 14 supported in whole or in part by public funds on the same 15 terms and conditions as the able-bodied a person who is not disabled, and an employer may not refuse employment to an 16 17 individual with a disability on the basis of his or her 18 disability alone, unless it is shown that the particular 19 disability prevents the satisfactory performance of the work 20 involved.

"(a) Blind persons, visually handicapped persons,

"(b) Housing accommodations" means any real property 3 or portion thereof which is used or occupied or is intended, 4 5 arranged, or designed to be used or occupied as the home, residence, or sleeping place of one or more human beings, but 6 7 shall not include any accommodations included within subsection (a) of this section or any single-family residence, 8 9 the occupants of which rent, lease, or furnish for 10 compensation not more than one room therein.

11 "(c)(b) Nothing in this section shall require any 12 person renting, leasing, or providing for compensation real 13 property to modify his <u>or her</u> property in any way or provide a 14 higher degree of care for a blind person, visually handicapped 15 person, or other physically disabled person <u>an individual with</u> 16 <u>a disability</u> than for a person who is not physically disabled.

"(3) A housing accommodation may request proof of
compliance with vaccination requirements for a service animal.
"(d) This act does not limit the rights or remedies
of a housing accommodation or an individual with a disability
that are granted by state or federal law with regard to other
assistance animals."
Section 2. Although this bill would have as its
purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased

8 purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased 9 expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further 10 requirements and application under Amendment 621, now 11 appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of 12 the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, because the 13 bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an 14 existing crime.

Section 3. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
