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- "(a) A person who is 17 years of age or older may

- "(b) A person who is 16 years of age may donate
  blood in a voluntary and noncompensatory blood donation
  program if the person obtains written permission from the
  person's parent or guardian.
  - "(c) A person 18 years of age or older may consent to donate blood or plasma without the permission of a parent or guardian. The consent is not subject to later disaffirmance because of minority."
- Section 2. Section 26-1-3, Code of Alabama 1975, is repealed.
- Section 3. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
