SYNOPSIS: This bill would relate to the Alabama 8 Criminal Justice Information Center Commission and 9 10 the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and 11 would further provide for the members of the commission and the operation of the commission and 12 center, including the providing of information 13 14 relating to homeland security. The bill would 15 authorize the commission to charge fees for information related to noncriminal background 16 17 checks, establish the crime of misuse of ACJIC 18 information, authorize the commission to establish 19 the Alabama Statistical Analysis Center and 20 authorize research and development.

The bill would also ratify and provide for the implementation of the National Crime Prevention and Privacy Act relating to the authorized interstate exchange of criminal information for noncriminal purposes and would authorize any licensing agency or board to require a criminal background check as a part of its licensing requirements.

Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama 3 4 of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of 5 Alabama of 1901, as amended, prohibits a general 6 7 law whose purpose or effect would be to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds from 8 becoming effective with regard to a local 9 10 governmental entity without enactment by a 2/3 vote 11 unless: it comes within one of a number of 12 specified exceptions; it is approved by the 13 affected entity; or the Legislature appropriates 14 funds, or provides a local source of revenue, to 15 the entity for the purpose.

The purpose or effect of this bill would be to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of the amendment. However, the bill does not require approval of a local governmental entity or enactment by a 2/3 vote to become effective because it comes within one of the specified exceptions contained in the amendment.

6 Department of Public Safety, fingerprints, descriptions,
7 photographs, when specifically requested, and other
8 identifying data on the following persons:

9 "(1) Persons who have been lawfully arrested in this 10 state for all felonies and certain misdemeanors <u>offenses</u> 11 described in Section 41-9-622.

12 "(2) Persons who have been charged with an act of 13 delinquency or adjudicated a youthful offender for conduct 14 which would constitute a felony or misdemeanor offense, as 15 described in subdivision (1), if committed by an adult.

16 "(b) All chiefs of police, sheriffs, prosecuting 17 attorneys, parole and probation officers, wardens, or other 18 persons in charge of correctional or detention institutions <u>or</u> 19 <u>other criminal justice agencies</u> in this state shall furnish 20 the ACJIC with any other data deemed necessary by the 21 commission to carry out its responsibilities under this 22 article.

"(c) All state agencies that maintain noncriminal
 justice or homeland security information may provide for ACJIC
 access to the data for inclusion in the ACJIC information
 systems.

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27 "§41-9-625.
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1 "All persons in this state in charge of law 2 enforcement and correction agencies shall obtain or cause to be obtained the fingerprints according to the fingerprint 3 4 system of identification established by the commission, full face and profile photographs, if photo equipment is available, 5 and other identifying data of each person arrested for an 6 7 offense of a type designated in Section 41-9-622, of all persons arrested or taken into custody as fugitives from 8 justice and of all unidentified human corpses in their 9 10 jurisdictions, but photographs need not be taken if it is 11 known that photographs of the type listed taken within the 12 previous year are on file. Fingerprints and other identifying 13 data of persons arrested for offenses other than those 14 designated in this article may be taken at the discretion of 15 the agency concerned.

If any person arrested or taken into custody is subsequently released without charge or cleared of the offense through criminal justice proceedings, such disposition shall be reported by all state, county and municipal criminal justice agencies to ACJIC within 30 days of such action, and all such information shall be eliminated and removed.

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"§41-9-630.

"(a) All persons in charge of criminal justice
agencies in this state shall furnish the ACJIC with any other
identifying data required in accordance with guidelines
established by the ACJIC commission.

1 "(b) All criminal justice agencies in this state
2 having criminal identification files shall cooperate in
3 providing to ACJIC information in such the files as will aid
4 in establishing the nucleus of the state criminal
5 identification file."

Section 2. (a) In order to facilitate the authorized 6 7 interstate exchange of criminal history information for noncriminal justice purposes, including, but not limited to, 8 background checks for the licensing and screening of employees 9 10 and volunteers under the National Child Protection Act of 1993, as amended, and to implement the National Crime 11 12 Prevention and Privacy Compact, 42 U.S.C. §14616, the 13 Legislature approves and ratifies the compact. The director 14 shall execute the compact on behalf of the state.

(b) The center is the repository of criminal history
records for purposes of the compact and shall do all things
necessary or incidental to carry out the compact.

(c) The director, or the director's designee, is the
state's compact officer and shall administer the compact
within the state. The commission may adopt rules and establish
procedures for the cooperative exchange of criminal history
records between the state and federal government for use in
noncriminal justice cases.

(d) The state's ratification of the compact remains
in effect until legislation is enacted which specifically
renounces the compact.

1 (e) This compact and this section do not affect or 2 abridge the obligations and responsibilities of the center 3 under other provisions of this article and does not alter or 4 amend the manner, direct or otherwise, in which the public is 5 afforded access to criminal history records under state law.

6 Section 3. In addition to any other requirements, 7 any licensing or permitting agency, board, or commission in 8 this state may by rule require a criminal background check as 9 part of its licensing or permitting requirements.

10 Section 4. Although this bill would have as its 11 purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased 12 expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further 13 requirements and application under Amendment 621, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of 14 the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, because the 15 bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an 16 17 existing crime.

Section 5. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
