17		Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama
18		of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the
19		Official Recompilation of the Constitution of
20		Alabama of 1901, as amended, prohibits a general
21		law whose purpose or effect would be to require a
22		new or increased expenditure of local funds from
23		becoming effective with regard to a local
24		governmental entity without enactment by a 2/3 vote
25		unless: it comes within one of a number of
26		specified exceptions; it is approved by the
27		affected entity; or the Legislature appropriates

funds, or provides a local source of revenue, to the entity for the purpose.

The purpose or effect of this bill would be to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of the amendment. However, the bill does not require approval of a local governmental entity or enactment by a 2/3 vote to become effective because it comes within one of the specified exceptions contained in the amendment.

Relating to large animals; to prohibit the possession, sale, transfer, and breeding of large wild cats, great apes, wolves, and non-native bears, except for possession by certain persons under certain conditions; to place certain conditions upon any person possessing large wild cats, great apes, wolves, or non-native bears after the effective date of this act; to provide for penalties; and in connection therewith would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended.

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
- 2 Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited
- 3 as the Exotic Animal Protection Act of 2021.
- 4 Section 2. For purposes of this act, the following
- 5 terms shall have the following meanings:
- 6 (1) ANIMAL CONTROL AUTHORITY. The agency designated
- 7 by a municipality or county to administer ordinances
- 8 regulating, restricting, or prohibiting the possession of
- 9 large wild cats, great apes, non-hybrid wolves, non-native
- bears, and hybrids of large wild cats, great apes, and
- 11 non-native bears. An animal control authority may be a
- municipal or county animal control agency, county sheriff, or
- another designated law enforcement agency.
- 14 (2) GREAT APE. A non-human member of the family
- 15 hominidae, as well as a gorilla, chimpanzee, bonobo, or
- orangutan.
- 17 (3) LARGE WILD CAT. A lion, tiger, leopard, jaguar,
- 18 cougar, or snow leopard. The term includes a hybrid of any of

- 20 (4) NON-NATIVE BEAR. Any bear that is not native to

- 25 (5) PERSON. Any individual, partnership,

- 3 (6) POSSESSOR. Any person who owns, possesses,
 4 keeps, harbors, brings into the state, acts as a custodian of,

 6 wolf, or non-native bear.
- 7 (7) WOLF. A gray wolf or red wolf. This term shall not include hybrids of any wolf.
- 9 Section 3. This act shall not apply to any of the following:

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- (1) Duly incorporated animal protection organizations, such as humane societies and shelters, housing a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear temporarily at the written request of the animal control authority or acting under the authority of this act.
- (2) Federal or state wildlife enforcement officers acting under the scope of their authority.
- (3) Animal control or law enforcement agencies or officers acting under the authority of this act.
- (4) Veterinary hospitals, clinics, veterinarians, and individuals employed at those facilities under the direction of a veterinarian who are actively treating a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear in their professional capacity as a veterinarian or employee of such facility.
- (5) A university, college, laboratory, or other research facility holding a Class R registration under the

federal Animal Welfare Act, 7 U.S.C. § 2131, et seq., as amended.

- 3 (6) A nonprofit wildlife sanctuary that meets all of 4 the following criteria:
- a. Operates a place of refuge where it provides care to abused, neglected, unwanted, impounded, abandoned, orphaned, or displaced animals for the lifetimes of the animals.
 - b. Does not conduct any transactions with respect to large wild cats, great apes, wolves, and non-native bears including, but not limited to, the sale, trade, auction, lease, or loan of large wild cats, great apes, wolves, or non-native bears.
 - c. Does not allow direct contact between the public and large wild cats, great apes, wolves, or non-native bears.
 - d. Does not use large wild cats, great apes, wolves, or non-native bears for entertainment purposes in a traveling exhibit.
 - e. Does not breed, accidentally or otherwise, large wild cats, great apes, wolves, or non-native bears.
 - (7) A person who possesses a valid United States

 Department of Agriculture Class A, B, or C license on or who

 obtains and maintains that licensure after the effective date

 of this act and is in compliance with the federal Animal

 Welfare Act, 7 U.S.C. § 2131, et seq., as amended.
 - (8) A person who is an intermediate handler, as defined by the federal Animal Welfare Act, 7 U.S.C. § 2132.

Section 4. Except as otherwise provided in this act,

a person shall not import, export, transport, sell, receive,

acquire, purchase, breed, or possess a large wild cat, great

ape, wolf, or non-native bear. This shall include transactions

conducted via the Internet.

Section 5. A person in legal possession of a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear prior to the effective date of this act and who is the legal possessor of the animal may keep possession of the animal for the remainder of the animal's life, subject to all of the following:

- (1) On or before January 1, 2022, the legal possessor shall register with the animal control authority for the municipality or county in which the animal is located.
- a. The registration shall include all of the following:
 - 1. The person's name, address, and telephone number.
 - 2. A complete inventory of each large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear that the person possesses, a photograph or microchip number for each animal, and the address for the site at which each animal is located.
 - 3. Payment to the animal control authority of a one-time fee of five hundred dollars (\$500) per site at which a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear is to be located.
- b. A possessor shall have a continuing obligation to promptly notify the animal control authority with jurisdiction

of any material changes to the information required for registration.

- (2) A possessor shall pay an annual fee of one hundred dollars (\$100) per large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear located in his or her possession.
 - (3) A possessor may not breed or acquire a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear.
 - (4) A possessor shall maintain veterinary records, acquisition papers, and other documents or records that establish that the person possessed each large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear prior to January 1, 2022, and shall present these records to an animal control or law enforcement authority upon request.
 - (5) A possessor shall comply with the basic standards and laws for maintaining animals and protecting the public under the federal Animal Welfare Act, 7 U.S.C. § 2131, et seq., as amended, and the rules adopted pursuant to that act, and shall allow the animal control authority reasonable access to the animal's enclosure in order to ensure that the animal is properly cared for and poses no risk of unauthorized contact with the public.
 - (6) A possessor shall prepare and submit upon request to the animal control authority a contingency plan to protect first responders by providing for the quick and safe recapture of a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear in the event of an escape.

1 (7) A possessor shall notify the animal control 2 authority, the local sheriff's department, and local police 3 department, if applicable, immediately upon discovery that a 4 large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear has 5 escaped.

- (8) A possessor shall be liable for any and all costs associated with the escape, capture, and disposition of a registered large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear.
- (9) A possessor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, or local laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, permits, or other permission regarding ownership of a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear. Failure to comply with any law, rule, regulation, ordinance, permit, or other permission constitutes a violation of this act.

Section 6. (a) An animal control authority or other person authorized to enforce the provisions of this act may confiscate a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear under any of the following circumstances:

- (1) The large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear poses an immediate, imminent danger to the health and safety of the public.
- (2) If a veterinarian determines, in writing, that a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear is in imminent danger of loss of life as a result of the action or inaction of its possessor.

(3) Upon conviction in a court of general jurisdiction that a person is holding or acquiring a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear in contravention of this act.

- ape, wolf, or non-native bear, an animal control authority or other person authorized to enforce this act shall notify a possessor of a confiscation in person or by certified mail with return receipt requested. The notice shall include language informing the recipient that, if a court of general jurisdiction in the county determines that the confiscated animal was in imminent danger of loss of life or an immediate threat to public safety, the possessor shall be responsible for payment of reasonable costs for caring and providing for the animal during the confiscation and that the possessor must meet all requirements for the animal to be returned to the possessor. Possessors are not responsible for costs of caring and providing for an improperly confiscated animal.
- (c) A large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear that is confiscated under this section shall be returned to the possessor if the animal control authority or law enforcement office establishes all of the following:
- (1) That the possessor had legal possession of the large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear pursuant to this act, state law, and federal law.

1 (2) The return of the large wild cat, great ape,
2 wolf, or non-native bear would not pose a public safety or
3 health risk.

- (3) The large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear is not in poor health or condition as a result of the action or inaction of its possessor.
- (d) If a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear that is confiscated under this section is not returned to the possessor under subsection (c), the animal control authority or other person designated under this act shall release the animal to a facility exempted pursuant to this act or to a United States Department of Agriculture Class C licensed facility in another state.

Section 7. (a) The animal control authority and its staff and agents, local law enforcement agents, state law enforcement agents, and county sheriffs are authorized to enforce this act.

(b) If a large wild cat, great ape, wolf, or non-native bear escapes or is released, and poses an immediate threat to public safety, the animal control authority or other person designated under this act may recapture, contain, or destroy the animal.

Section 8. A person in violation of this act shall be guilty of a Class A misdemeanor punishable by a fine of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for a first offense and five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a second offense.

Section 9. A municipality or county may adopt an ordinance governing large wild cats, great apes, wolves, or non-native bears that is more restrictive than this act.

However, nothing in this act requires a municipality or county to adopt any ordinance.

Section 10. Although this bill would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further requirements and application under Amendment 621, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, because the bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an existing crime.

Section 11. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
