1 SB31 2 3 4 ENROLLED, An Act, Relating to runoff elections; to amend Sections 5 6 11-46-6, 11-46-21, and 11-46-55 and Section 17-13-3, as last 7 amended by Act 2019-318, 2019 Regular Session, Code of Alabama 8 1975; to provide that all runoff municipal and runoff special 9 primary elections be held four weeks after the previous election; and to make nonsubstantive, technical revisions to 10 11 update the existing code language to current style. 12 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: Section 1. Sections 11-46-6, 11-46-21, and 11-46-55 13 14 and Section 17-13-3, as last amended by Act 2019-318, 2019 15 Regular Session, Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows: 16 17 "§11-46-6. "(a) The provisions of this section shall apply to 18 19 all Class 5 cities, according to Section 11-40-12. "(b) Any Class 5 city may hold its city election on 20 the second Tuesday in July, 1980, and the runoff election 21 22 three four weeks after said that second Tuesday, with the city 23 election every three years thereafter to be held at the same 24 appointed time, upon adoption of a resolution to such effect 25 by the city governing body.

1 "(c) The provisions of this section are cumulative 2 and shall not be construed to repeal or supersede any laws or 3 parts of laws not directly inconsistent herewith.

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"§11-46-21.

5 "(a) The regular municipal elections in cities and 6 towns shall be held on the fourth Tuesday in August 1984, and 7 quadrennially thereafter, and, when necessary as provided in 8 subsection (d) of Section 11-46-55, a second or runoff 9 election shall be held on the sixth fourth Tuesday next 10 thereafter following the regular election.

"(b) Special elections shall be held on the second or fourth Tuesday of any month when ordered by the municipal governing body; provided, that notice of such the election shall be published in the manner prescribed in Section 11-46-22 on or before the corresponding Tuesday of the second month preceding the month in which the special election is to be held.

18 "(c) Municipal officers elected at regular elections 19 shall assume the duties of their respective offices on the 20 first Monday in November following their election unless 21 otherwise provided in this article and shall serve until their 22 successors are elected and qualified.

23 "§11-46-55.

24 "(a) Commencing at 12:00 noon on the first Tuesday
 25 next after the election, the municipal governing body shall

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1 proceed to open the envelopes addressed to the governing body 2 which have been delivered by the several returning officers to the municipal clerk, canvass the returns, and ascertain and 3 determine the number of votes received by each candidate and 4 5 for and against each proposition submitted at the election. If 6 it appears that any candidate or any proposition in the election has received a majority of the votes cast for that 7 office or on that question, the municipal governing body shall 8 declare the candidate elected to the office or the question 9 10 carried, and a certificate of election shall be given to the 11 persons individuals by the municipal governing body or a majority of them, which shall entitle the persons individuals 12 13 so certified to the possession of their respective offices 14 immediately upon the expiration of the terms of their 15 predecessors as provided by law. If the certification results 16 of provisional ballots cast at the election have been received 17 from the board of registrars prior to the first Tuesday next 18 after the election, or if no provisional votes were cast in the election, the municipal governing body, at any special or 19 20 regular meeting, may canvass canvass the results before the 21 first Tuesday next after the election.

"(b) If a single office is to be filled at the
election and there is more than one candidate therefor
<u>running</u>, then the majority of the votes cast for the office in
the election shall be ascertained by dividing the total votes

1 cast for all candidates for the office by two, and any number 2 of votes in excess of one half of the total votes cast for all 3 candidates for the office shall be a majority within the 4 meaning of subsection (a).

5 "(c) If two or more offices constituting a group are 6 to be filled and there are more candidates for election than there are offices, then the majority of the votes cast for the 7 8 office in the election shall be ascertained by dividing the total vote cast for all candidates for the offices by the 9 10 number of positions to be filled and then dividing the result 11 by two. Any number of votes in excess of the number 12 ascertained by the last division shall be the majority 13 prescribed in subsection (a) as necessary for election. If in 14 ascertaining the result in this way it appears that more 15 candidates have obtained this majority than there are 16 positions to be filled, then those having the highest vote, if 17 beyond the majority just defined, shall be declared elected to 18 fill such the positions.

19 "(d) If no candidate receives a majority of all the 20 votes cast in such the election for any one office or offices 21 for the election to which there were more than two candidates, 22 then the municipal governing body shall order a second or 23 runoff election to be held on the sixth fourth Tuesday next 24 thereafter following the regular election, at which election 25 the two candidates having received the most and the second

1 most votes, respectively, shall be candidates, and the person 2 individual receiving the highest number of votes for that office in the runoff election shall be declared elected. If 3 only two candidates are standing for election for any one 4 5 office or offices and neither candidate receives a majority, 6 then the municipal governing body shall order a second or 7 runoff election to be held on the sixth fourth Tuesday next 8 thereafter following the regular election, at which election 9 the two candidates shall be candidates, and the person 10 individual receiving the highest number of votes for that 11 office in the runoff election shall be declared elected. In the event one of the candidates for a particular office in the 12 13 runoff election withdraws, then there need not be a second 14 election to fill the office nor shall the name of either the party so withdrawing or the remaining candidate be printed on 15 16 the ballot of any second election held under this article. 17 This second election shall be held by the same election 18 officers who held the first election and at the same places the first election was held. If there should be a tie vote 19 20 cast at any runoff election, then in that event the tie shall 21 be decided by the municipal governing body no later than 12:00 22 noon on the first Tuesday following the second or runoff 23 election. A vote for a particular candidate by a majority of 24 those members eligible to vote of the governing body shall be necessary to decide the election in his or her favor. If the 25

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1 municipal governing body fails to break the tie, the elected 2 candidate shall be decided by lot by the judge of probate of the county no later than 5:00 P.M. p.m. on the first Tuesday 3 following the second or runoff election in the presence of the 4 5 candidates and other electors who choose to be present. No Any 6 probate judge of probate who openly participated in the 7 promotion of candidates in the election which resulted in a 8 tie shall may not decide the outcome of the election and shall 9 be disqualified to do so. The presiding circuit court judge in 10 the county in which the election was held shall replace the 11 disqualified probate judge of probate and shall conduct the duties required herein. The municipal clerk shall file a copy 12 of each certificate of election in the office of the judge of 13 14 probate of the county in which the city or town is situated, 15 and the judge shall file the certificate in the same manner 16 that he or she files the declaration of the result of 17 elections to county offices.

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"§17-13-3.

"(a) Except as otherwise provided in subsection
<u>subsections</u> (b) <u>and (d)</u>, primary elections, except special
primary elections and presidential preference primaries, held
at the expense of the state or counties, shall be held on the
fourth Tuesday in May. When necessary, as provided in this
chapter, a second or runoff primary election shall be held on
the fourth Tuesday following the primary election. Any second

primary shall be held by the same election officers who held the first primary <u>election</u>, and be held at the same places as the first primary election. No primary <u>election</u> shall be held by any political party except as <u>herein</u> provided <u>in this</u> <u>subsection</u>. Primary elections <u>herein provided for</u> shall be held at the regular polling places established for the purpose of holding general elections.

8 "(b) In years in which a presidential primary is 9 conducted, the primary election shall be the first Tuesday in 10 March.

"(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, in any year in which the primary election is held in March and the primary election is held in conjunction with the presidential preference primary election, as provided in this section and Section 17-13-100, any reference in any existing statutes to a primary election being held in June or May shall be construed to refer to the primary election in March.

"(d) Special primary elections, held at the expense 18 of the state or counties, shall be held following the issuance 19 20 of a proclamation by the Governor or as otherwise provided by 21 law. When necessary, as provided in this chapter, a second or 22 runoff special primary election shall be held on the fourth Tuesday following the special primary election. Any second 23 24 special primary election shall be held by the same election 25 officers who held the first special primary election, and be

1	held at the same places as the first special primary election.
2	No special primary election shall be held by any political
3	party, except as provided in this subsection. Special primary
4	elections shall be held at the regular polling places
5	established for the purpose of holding general elections."
6	Section 2. This act shall become effective on
7	January 1, 2022, following its passage and approval by the
8	Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
