SYNOPSIS: This bill would establish the crime of home invasion if a person enters an occupied dwelling with intent to use force or violence on another person or to commit a robbery. The crime of home invasion would be a Class A felony which would not be subject to probation, parole, or a suspended

Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, prohibits a general law whose purpose or effect would be to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds from becoming effective with regard to a local governmental entity without enactment by a 2/3 vote unless: it comes within one of a number of specified exceptions; it is approved by the affected entity; or the Legislature appropriates funds, or provides a local source of revenue, to the entity for the purpose.

The purpose or effect of this bill would be
to require a new or increased expenditure of local
funds within the meaning of the amendment. However,
the bill does not require approval of a local
governmental entity or enactment by a 2/3 vote to
become effective because it comes within one of the
specified exceptions contained in the amendment.

11 AN ACT

To establish the crime of home invasion; to provide criminal penalties; and in connection therewith would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. This act shall be known as The Alabama Home Invasion Act of 2012.

Section 2. (a) Home invasion is the unauthorized entering, either by force, with or without a weapon, or by coercion or subterfuge to gain entry, of any occupied dwelling with the intent to use force or violence upon another person or to commit a robbery therein.

1 (b) This section does not apply to a law enforcement 2 officer acting within the line and scope of official duties.

(c) A person who violates this section is guilty of home invasion. Home invasion is a Class A felony which shall not be subject to probation, parole, or a suspended sentence.

Section 3. Although this bill would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further requirements and application under Amendment 621, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, because the bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an existing crime.

Section 4. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
