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8	RENAMING THE EDMUND PETTUS BRIDGE THE JOURNEY TO
9	FREEDOM BRIDGE.
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11	WHEREAS, in 1940, 33 years after his death, the
12	bridge spanning the Alabama River in Selma was named for
13	Edmund Pettus, a Grand Dragon of the Alabama Ku Klux Klan,
14	among other things; and
15	WHEREAS, Edmund Pettus will forever be remembered
16	for the enforcement of laws that prevented African Americans
17	from equal access to education, jobs, political
18	representation, and other benefits of American citizenship;
19	and
20	WHEREAS, 25 years after the Edmund Pettus Bridge was
21	built, people all over America and the world watched a moment
22	in history that would forever change the course of their
23	nation; as peaceful marchers fearlessly crossed the bridge,
24	the nation had its consciousness awakened by images of the
25	brutality wreaked upon them by those sworn to uphold the law;
26	and

WHEREAS, this moment became known as Bloody Sunday; subsequently, there was the Turn Around Tuesday March and the Selma to Montgomery March over the Edmund Pettus Bridge; and

WHEREAS, these marches became forever remembered as a turning point in the Civil Rights Movement, and the Black Belt City of Selma would be remembered as a beacon of change that led to the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965; and

WHEREAS, the Voting Rights Act and other civil rights legislation initiated by the Civil Rights Movement have been crucial in establishing equal rights; and

WHEREAS, 50 years after Bloody Sunday and other marches, Selma's young people gathered over 180,000 signatures over a period of two months in support of renaming the bridge, and this new generation of young people believes that the current name of the bridge is a symbol of the past that must be changed; and

WHEREAS, there are many things in our society to change that are more significant than the name of a bridge, but removing this vestige of the past will serve as a parallel to the ongoing journey towards equal rights, fair representation, and open opportunity; it is a statement by Selma's young people and the rest of the country that we will continue to strive towards equal opportunity for all American people; and

WHEREAS, there are so many incredible freedom fighters, martyrs, and civil rights leaders that paved the way for the changes wrought in the last 50 years; and

WHEREAS, although there are many nonviolent leaders and foot soldiers who deserve to be honored, rather than creating the John Lewis Bridge, the Amelia Boynton Bridge, the Viola Liuzzo Bridge, or the Jimmie Lee Jackson Bridge, the young people have proposed that the bridge be renamed the "Journey to Freedom Bridge"; and

WHEREAS, the Journey to Freedom Bridge will be a lasting monument that will encompass the entirety of the Civil Rights Movement and all the individuals that have fought and continue to fight to lift all people; it is a promise that in the next 50 years things in Selma, Alabama, and the nation will be better than they were 50 years ago as this generation commits to continue our country's ongoing journey to freedom; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That the bridge once known as the Edmund Pettus Bridge shall henceforth be renamed and known as the Journey to Freedom Bridge.
