WHEREAS, born January 4, 1878, in Tennessee, he was the son of James Edwin Horton, Sr., also a judge, and Emily Donelson Horton, who was the great niece of President Andrew Jackson; he earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Cumberland University in Lebanon, Tennessee, and a law degree from the Cumberland School of Law; he embarked upon his distinguished legal career clerking for his father before entering into private law practice; he served in both the Alabama House of Representatives and the Alabama Senate; in addition, he served as a chancery court judge and as a circuit court judge for two terms; he lost a third term as a circuit court judge because of his courageous, remarkable decision in the Patterson Case; afterward, he spent his life farming and practicing private law; he was married to Anna Hobbs Horton, and their union was graced with two sons, James Edwin Horton, III, and Donelson Branch Horton; and

WHEREAS, through the years, Judge Horton earned immense respect for his tireless dedication and exceptional abilities; he left an inspiring legacy for many to cherish and emulate; now therefore,
