| 11 | WHEREAS, it is a tremendous privilege to                       |
| 12 | posthumously honor the members of the Haynes Lifeflight Crew   |
| 13 | from Southeast Alabama that crashed in Goodman, Alabama, on    |
| 14 | March 26, 2016; and  |
| 15 | WHEREAS, the Haynes Lifeflight Crew, consisting of             |
| 16 | the pilot, Chad Hammond, age 29, nurse Stasi Cernadas, age 38, |
| 17 | and flight medic Jason Snipes, age 34, was dispatched to pick  |
| 18 | up Zach Strickland, age 27, who was involved in an automobile  |
| 19 | accident and needed to be flown to Montgomery; and             |
| 20 | WHEREAS, after the crew picked up Mr. Strickland,              |
| 21 | the helicopter crashed approximately a half-mile from the      |
| 22 | scene of the automobile accident and all four passengers of    |
| 23 | the helicopter were killed; and                                |
| 24 | WHEREAS, Mr. Hammond, a husband and a father, joined           |
| 25 | Metro Aviation, Inc., which operated the helicopter for Haynes |
| 26 | Ambulance of Alabama, in October 2015, and he was previously   |
| 27 | an instructor at Cloud 9 Helicopters in Florida; Mr. Hammond   |

attended George C. Wallace Community College and was a 2005 graduate of Eufaula High School; he was recognized just three years ago by the Federal Aviation Administration by being included in the FAA Airmen Certification Database, a certification reserved for pilots who have met or exceeded the high educational, licensing, and medical standards established by the FAA; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Cernadas was born in Huntsville but reared in Georgia; she was a former flight attendant and a trauma nurse in Montgomery before becoming a flight nurse in September 2015; her father, Javier Cernadas, said that she was living out her dream of being a flight nurse and he conveyed his immense pride in his daughter; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Snipes was previously a supervisor with Regional Paramedical Services of Alabama and based in Shelby County before he joined the crew at Haynes; he is described as being a very compassionate person who was an outstanding paramedic; he was known for contacting his patients afterwards to offer words of encouragement or even his favorite scripture to help those patients through their difficult recovery time; although often called a hero for his efforts, he liked to give credit where he thought credit was due, saying that he was not the hero, but that God did His work through Mr. Snipes' hands; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Haynes Lifeflight Crew were all valued members of their communities and their commitment to their professions and their ultimate heroic

sacrifice will never be forgotten; through the years, their
memory will live on in the hearts and minds of those who were
fortunate enough to know them, and their inspiring courage and
legacy will be forever cherished; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we posthumously honor and commend the Haynes Lifeflight Crew from Southeast Alabama, and it is directed that a copy of this resolution shall be presented to the friends and family of each of the crew members in highest tribute of their noble lives.
