192232-1:n:02/27/2018:DSM*/th LSA2018-1038 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 URGING THE UNITED STATES TO PROVIDE FOR CONTINUED 8 9 AND EXPANDED ACCESS TO GULF OF MEXICO OFFSHORE OIL AND NATURAL 10 GAS. 11 WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes the critical 12 13 importance of energy to the people and businesses who reside 14 in the state, which is in the top 15 for both energy use and 15 energy expenses per capita; and WHEREAS, on July 3, 2017, the United States 16 17 Department of the Interior initiated the development of a new 18 National Outer Continental Shelf Oil and Gas Leasing Program (OCS) for 2019-2024; and 19 20 WHEREAS, on January 8, 2018, the United States 21 Department of the Interior issued a 2019-2024 draft proposed 22 Outer Continental Shelf Oil and Gas Leasing Program that 23 includes continued and expanded opportunities to develop Gulf 24 of Mexico energy, which will benefit Alabama's economy and 25 citizens; and 26 WHEREAS, the Gulf of Mexico region contributes nearly 20 percent of the nation's crude oil production; and 27

1 WHEREAS, the Department of Interior estimates that 2 in fiscal year 2014, Gulf of Mexico offshore oil and natural 3 gas activity sustained 651,000 jobs, including 18,000 in 4 Alabama, and provided over seven billion dollars in revenue to 5 the federal government; and

6 WHEREAS, an analysis by Quest Offshore has estimated 7 that for Alabama, expanded access to Gulf of Mexico energy 8 resources could create 23,000 jobs, over 1.7 billion dollars 9 in annual Gross Domestic Product, and over 3.5 billion dollars 10 in state government revenue; and

11 WHEREAS, the Quest Offshore analysis also found that 12 expanded access to Gulf of Mexico energy resources could 13 generate an additional one million barrels of oil equivalent 14 per day, or 55 percent of the nation's daily crude oil and 15 petroleum product imports from the Persian Gulf; and

16 WHEREAS, the Department of the Interior has 17 estimated that without Gulf of Mexico lease sales, the nation 18 would have to rely on imports to replace nearly 60 percent of 19 the foregone production; and without Gulf of Mexico lease 20 sales over a five-year period, between five billion dollars 21 and 13 billion dollars in environmental and social costs would 22 result; and

23 WHEREAS, the United States Interior Secretary has 24 stated, "...it is better to develop our energy here under 25 reasonable regulations rather than have it produced overseas 26 with little or no regulation...."; and

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WHEREAS, offshore oil and natural gas revenue sharing, authorized by the Gulf of Mexico Energy Security Act of 2006, is essential to maintaining a strong Alabama coastline and economy and ensuing the long-term sustainability of Alabama's energy infrastructure; and

6 WHEREAS, the federal government has previously 7 proposed the repeal of revenue sharing; and

8 WHEREAS, members of the Alabama Congressional 9 Delegation have supported revenue sharing and efforts to lift 10 the existing statutory cap of Gulf of Mexico revenue sharing; 11 now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we urge the federal government to provide for continued and expanded access in the Gulf of Mexico in the 2019-2024 National OCS Program.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we further urge the federal government to continue revenue sharing with Gulf Coast states and support congressional efforts to lift the existing revenue sharing cap currently in place for gulf producing states.

21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this 22 resolution be transmitted to the President of the United 23 States, the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, the 24 Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the 25 Majority Leader of the United States Senate, and each member 26 of the Alabama Congressional Delegation.
