| 10 | WHEREAS, prostate cancer is the second leading cause           |

| 13 | WHEREAS, in 2021, there are expected to be about               |
| 14 | 164,690 new cases of prostate cancer and about 29,430 deaths   |

| 17 | WHEREAS, prostate cancer affects all races and                 |
| 18 | socioeconomic classes; however, African American men are at an |

| 22 | WHEREAS, overall, African American men are 1.7 times           |

WHEREAS, additional focus is needed on the personal and social burdens of prostate cancer to anticipate the needs and to provide support to the patient and his family and other caregivers; and

WHEREAS, there is still more research to be done for prostate cancer so that new and more effective treatments can be developed; Alabama will continue to push for critical research and advanced treatments for prostate cancer; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we designate September 2021 as Prostate Cancer Awareness Month; we ask the citizens of Alabama to become informed and aware of prostate cancer so that they can have an informed conversation with their health care providers regarding screening and diagnostic methods, and, if necessary, treatments to improve health outcomes and psychosocial support for people affected by prostate cancer.
