6	TO ESTABLISH A STUDY COMMITTEE ON FAMILY CAREGIVING.

8	WHEREAS, family caregivers are considered the
9	backbone of Alabama's long-term care system; and
10	WHEREAS, a 2013 PEW study estimates that 39 percent
11	of the adult population care for a loved one with significant
12	health issues; and
13	WHEREAS, that study would estimate that 1.8 million
14	Alabamians are providing care for a loved one or family
15	member; and
16	WHEREAS, the population of the state that is 85
17	years of age or older and most likely to need caregiving
18	assistance is projected to reach one million in the next
19	decade; and
20	WHEREAS, almost all people who need assistance with
21	activities of daily living want to remain in their homes and
22	communities; and
23	WHEREAS, providing services and support in homes and
24	communities is generally much less expensive than nursing home
25	care; and

1	WHEREAS, people who receive services from caregivers
2	in their homes are much less likely to need public assistance;
3	and
4	WHEREAS, almost three-fourths of older people living
5	in the community who receive personal assistance relied
6	exclusively on unpaid caregivers for help; and
7	WHEREAS, the most recent survey completed by the
8	AARP Public Policy Institute shows the population of
9	caregivers who are caring for an adult with a disability or
10	chronic health condition in Alabama is estimated at 818,000,
11	and these caregivers are providing 783,000,000 hours of unpaid
12	respite at a market rate of \$7,800,000,000, saving the State
13	and Federal Government billions of dollars in health
14	care-related costs; and
15	WHEREAS, in addition to the 2014 National Alzheimer
16	Report showing 86,000 Alabamians diagnosed with Alzheimer's
17	disease, the 2012 U.S. census estimates over 425,000
18	Alabamians representing 15.5 percent of adults aged 21-64 as
19	having a disability, and most of these identified individuals
20	with special health care or behavioral issues require a
21	caregiver to assist with their independence, living at home or
22	in the community; and
23	WHEREAS, the number of caregivers providing care to
24	children with disabilities is in addition to the adult
25	caregiver statistics listed above, and their hours of unpaid

respite reflect similar health care-related cost savings to the state; this group includes those caring for the 6,200 children age birth to three served in Alabama's Early Intervention Program in 2014 and another 133,000 children ages 3-21 enrolled in Alabama Department of Education Special Education Programs, with both age groups inclusive of CDC's estimate of 1 in 68 children reported as having an identified Autism Spectrum Disorder; and

WHEREAS, to successfully address the surging population of older adults who have significant needs for long-term services and support, in addition to the long-term services and support needs of those affected by developmental and acquired disabilities, the state must develop methods to both encourage and support families to assist their relatives affected by aging or disability and develop ways to recruit and retain a qualified, responsive in-home care workforce; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That (1) the Alabama Department of Senior Services (ADSS) is urged to establish a study committee on family caregiving and long-term support and services for the purpose of providing recommendations and advice to the Governor and Legislature to encourage innovative and creative means to support family caregivers to continue to provide needed in-home support for older adults and individuals with

L	disabilities	and	chronic	conditions	who	need	long-term
2	services and	supp	ports.				

- (2) The study committee is further requested to identify policies, resources, and programs available for family caregivers and encourage additional innovative and creative means to support family caregivers to continue to provide needed in-home support for care recipients.
- (3) The ADSS shall include representatives from the Alabama Lifespan Respite Resource Network and Coalition, AARP Alabama, the Disability Leadership Coalition of Alabama, the Alabama Developmental Disability Council, health and human service agencies, and other interested stakeholders including family caregiver representatives to participate in the study committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution shall be sent to the Alabama Department of Senior Services.
