CREATING THE ALABAMA JUVENILE JUSTICE TASK FORCE.

10 WHEREAS, the financial and administrative costs of 11 providing housing, transportation, and services for juveniles 12 in detention or participating in programs through the juvenile 13 justice system grows significantly each year; and

14 WHEREAS, while the financial and administrative 15 responsibility for juveniles who find themselves a part of the 16 state's juvenile justice system should be shared among the 17 state, the counties, and the municipalities, these state and 18 local governmental entities do not currently share the cost or 19 the administrative functions related to providing housing, 20 transportation, and services in an equitable manner; and

21 WHEREAS, the costs are shared today through an 22 antiquated system that has not undergone extensive review in 23 decades; and

24 WHEREAS, a sharing of the costs in a structured and 25 comprehensive manner could provide opportunities for more 26 effective services available for juveniles as an alternative 27 to detention utilized in part due to the lack of sufficient state and local financial resources needed to offer adequate
 alternative programs and services throughout the state; and

3 WHEREAS, there is a need for a comprehensive study 4 of Alabama's juvenile justice system which should include, but 5 not be limited to, each of the following:

6 (1) A review of the costs and administrative 7 functions related to providing housing, transportation, and 8 programs for juveniles throughout the state.

9 (2) Consideration of the proper financial and 10 administrative participation which should come from the state, 11 counties, and municipalities for housing juveniles and 12 providing transportation and local programs and services.

(3) Consideration of the resources necessary to
adequately fund the Department of Youth Services in order that
it may carry out its responsibilities, including but not
limited to, the housing of juveniles being detained per court
order and programs designed to address delinquency issues.

(4) A review of current procedures and practices
related to the transportation of juveniles to develop
cost-cutting and time-saving measures such as a region-based
transportation system and video conferencing for preliminary
appearances and hearings to reduce the number of times
juveniles must be transported to and from court.

(5) A review of currently available juvenile justice
 programs and policies throughout the state to identify
 opportunities for funding alternative programs which could
 reduce the number of juveniles actually held in detention and

offer a better opportunity for juveniles to address issues
 that led to their placement in the juvenile justice system.

3 (6) Any other issues determined to be relevant and
4 important in developing and implementing long-term solutions
5 to the financial and program needs of Alabama's juvenile
6 justice system.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH
HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That there is created the Alabama
Juvenile Justice Task Force.

10 (a) The task force shall be comprised of the11 following members:

12 (1) One member representing the Governor's office13 appointed by the Governor;

14 (2) One member of the majority party in the Senate15 appointed by the Senate President Pro Tempore.

16 (3) One member of the minority party in the Senate17 appointed by the Lieutenant Governor.

18 (4) One member of the majority party in the House of
19 Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of
20 Representatives.

(5) One member of the minority party in the House of
 Representatives appointed by the Minority Leader of the House
 of Representatives.

24 (6) One district attorney appointed by the District25 Attorney's Association.

26 (7) The Commissioner of the Department of Youth
27 Services or his or her designee.

(8) One member appointed by the Association of
 County Commissions of Alabama.

3 (9) One member appointed by the Alabama League of
4 Municipalities.

5 (10) One sheriff appointed by the Alabama Sheriff's
6 Association.

7 (11) One police officer appointed by the Alabama
8 Police Officers Association.

9 (12) The Director of the Alabama Law Institute or 10 his or her designee.

(13) One juvenile court judge appointed by the ChiefJustice of the Alabama Supreme Court.

13 (14) One juvenile probation officer appointed by the14 Alabama Chief Probation Officers Association.

(b) The appointing authorities shall coordinate their appointments to assure the task force membership is inclusive and reflects the racial, gender, geographic, urban, rural, and economic diversity of the state. The task force shall study and identify causes and potential legislative solutions for the problems set out herein and otherwise identified by members of the task force.

(c) All appointments to the commission shall be made
before June 1, 2016, and each member of the commission shall
serve at the pleasure of his or her appointing authority.

(d) The task force member from the Governor's office
shall call the organizational meeting of the task force to be
held no later than September 1, 2016, and serve as chair until

the election of a chair as provided herein. At the 1 2 organizational meeting, the task force shall elect a chair and vice chair, who shall serve at the pleasure of the task force. 3 4 The vice chair shall serve as acting chair whenever the chair is unable to preside at a meeting of the task force. A quorum 5 for all meetings of the commission shall consist of eight 6 7 members. If a quorum is not present at the beginning of any meeting, the members present shall have the authority to 8 establish an alternate meeting date. 9

(e) The task force shall report its findings,
conclusions, and recommendations for proposed legislation to
the Legislature no later than the fifth day of the 2017
Regular Session, whereupon it shall stand dissolved and
discharged of any further duties and liabilities.

(f) Upon the request of the chair, the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House of Representatives shall provide necessary clerical assistance for the work of the task force.

(g) Each non-legislative member of the task force may be reimbursed for expenses related to attending meetings consistent with the policies of the various appointing authorities.

(h) Each legislative member of the task force shall
be entitled to his or her regular legislative compensation,
per diem, and travel expenses for each day he or she attends a
meeting of the task force in accordance with Amendment 871 of
the Constitution of Alabama of 1901. These payments shall be

paid out of any funds appropriated to the use of the
 Legislature by means of warrants drawn by the Comptroller on
 the State Treasury.
