A BILL FOR AN ACT

101	CONCERNING TEACHING CIVIL GOVERNMENT IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS,
102	INCLUDING THE HISTORY, CULTURE, AND CONTRIBUTIONS OF
103	American Indians, Hispanic Americans, African
104	AMERICANS, AND ASIAN AMERICANS, AND, IN CONNECTION
105	THEREWITH, MAKING AN APPROPRIATION.

Bill Summary

The bill mandates funding instruction in public schools of history and civil government of the United States and Colorado, including but not



HOUSE Amended 2nd Reading April 28, 2017 limited to the history, culture, and contributions of American Indians, Hispanic Americans, African Americans, and Asian Americans.

Current law requires school districts to convene community forums to discuss the content standards in history and civil government at least once every 10 years. The bill requires the forums to be held at least every 2 years.

The history, culture, and civil government in education commission is established to make recommendations to the state board of education when the state board performs the scheduled review of education standards in 2018 so those standards and programs accurately reflect the history, culture, and civil government of the United States and Colorado, including the contributions and influence of American Indians, Hispanic Americans, African Americans, and Asian Americans.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

2 **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **amend** 22-1-104 as 3 follows:

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22-1-104. Teaching of history, culture, and civil government.

5 (1) The history and civil government of the state of Colorado shall be 6 taught in all the public schools of this state.

7 (2) In addition, (1) The history and civil government of the 8 United States AND OF THE STATE OF COLORADO, which includes the 9 history, culture, and contributions of minorities, including, but not limited 10 to, the American Indians, the Hispanic Americans, and the African 11 Americans, shall AND ASIAN AMERICANS, MUST be taught in all the public 12 schools of the state.

13 (3) (a) (2) Satisfactory completion of a course on the civil government of the United States and the state of Colorado, which 14 15 includes INCLUDING the subjects described in subsection (2) SUBSECTION 16 (1) of this section, shall be IS a condition of high school graduation in the 17 public schools of this state.

(b) The condition of graduation described in paragraph (a) of this

subsection (3) shall apply only to students entering their first year of high
 school on and after August 6, 2003.

3 (4) (3) (a) In an effort to increase civic participation among young 4 people, each school district board of education shall convene a 5 community forum on a periodic basis, but not less than once every ten 6 TWO years, for all interested persons to discuss adopted content standards 7 in civics, including the subjects described in subsection (2) SUBSECTION 8 (1) of this section. THE HISTORY, CULTURE, AND CIVIL GOVERNMENT IN 9 EDUCATION COMMISSION ESTABLISHED IN SECTION 22-1-104.3 SHALL 10 ACTIVELY PARTICIPATE IN ANY SUCH FORUMS.

(b) Based upon input from this community forum, each school
district board of education shall determine how the subject areas specified
in SUBSECTION (1) OF this section are addressed when establishing
graduation requirements.

15 (5) (4) (a) In an effort to strengthen the teaching of the history, 16 CULTURE, AND CIVIL GOVERNMENT of the state of Colorado and of the 17 United States in all public schools of the state in accordance with the 18 requirements of this section, the department of education, IN 19 CONJUNCTION WITH THE HISTORY, CULTURE, AND CIVIL GOVERNMENT IN 20 EDUCATION COMMISSION ESTABLISHED IN SECTION 22-1-104.3, shall assist 21 the school districts of the state in developing and promoting programs for 22 elementary and secondary students that engage the students in the process 23 of discovery and interpretation of historical topics THE SUBJECTS AND 24 TOPICS SET FORTH IN SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS SECTION.

(b) The department of education is authorized to accept gifts,
 grants, and donations in furtherance of the objectives specified in
 paragraph (a) of this subsection (5) SUBSECTION (4)(a) OF THIS SECTION.

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1 (c) It is the intent of the general assembly that the objectives 2 specified in paragraph (a) of this subsection (5) SUBSECTION (4)(a) OF 3 THIS SECTION are to be funded through the state education fund created in 4 section 17 (4) of article IX of the state constitution. The general assembly 5 hereby finds that the development, promotion, and maintenance by the 6 school districts of the state of programs for elementary and secondary 7 students that engage such students in the process of discovery and 8 interpretation of historical topics THE SUBJECTS AND TOPICS SET FORTH IN 9 SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS SECTION assists these students in meeting state 10 academic standards and may therefore be funded from moneys MONEY in 11 the state education fund.

12 (6) (5) (a) In an effort to strengthen the teaching of civic education 13 HISTORY, CULTURE, AND CIVIL GOVERNMENT, AS DESCRIBED IN 14 SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS SECTION, in all public schools of the state in 15 accordance with the requirements of this section, the department of 16 education, IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE HISTORY, CULTURE, AND CIVIL 17 GOVERNMENT IN EDUCATION COMMISSION ESTABLISHED IN SECTION 18 22-1-104.3, shall assist the school districts of the state in developing and 19 promoting programs for elementary and secondary students that address 20 the state model content standards for HISTORY AND civics and promote 21 best practices in civic education WHILE ALSO ADDRESSING THE SUBJECTS 22 AND TOPICS DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS SECTION.

(b) It is the intent of the general assembly that the objectives
specified in this subsection (6) SUBSECTION (5) are to be funded through
the state education fund created in section 17 (4) of article IX of the state
constitution. The general assembly hereby finds that the development,
promotion, and maintenance by the school districts of the state of

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programs for elementary and secondary students that address the state model content standards for HISTORY AND civics and promote best practices in civic education WHILE ADDRESSING THE SUBJECTS AND TOPICS DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS SECTION assist these students in meeting state academic standards and may therefore be funded from moneys MONEY in the state education fund.

7 (6) THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION SHALL TAKE INTO
8 CONSIDERATION ANY RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE HISTORY, CULTURE, AND
9 CIVIL GOVERNMENT IN EDUCATION COMMISSION ESTABLISHED IN SECTION
10 22-1-104.3 WHEN PERFORMING ITS SIX-YEAR REVIEW OF THE STATE'S
11 EDUCATION STANDARDS PURSUANT TO SECTION 22-7-1005 (6).

SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 22-1-104.3 as
follows:

14 22-1-104.3. History, culture, and civil government in education 15 commission - established - membership - duties. (1) THERE IS 16 ESTABLISHED THE HISTORY, CULTURE, AND CIVIL GOVERNMENT IN 17 EDUCATION COMMISSION, REFERRED TO IN THIS SECTION AS THE 18 "COMMISSION". THE PURPOSE OF THE COMMISSION IS TO MAKE 19 RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND 20 DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO BE USED IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE 21 REGULAR SIX-YEAR REVIEW OF THE STATE'S EDUCATION STANDARDS AND 22 PROGRAMS, PURSUANT TO SECTION 22-7-1005 (6). THE 23 RECOMMENDATIONS MUST SEEK TO FURTHER THE DISCOVERY, 24 INTERPRETATION, AND LEARNING OF THE HISTORY, CULTURE, AND CIVIL 25 GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND COLORADO, INCLUDING THE 26 CONTRIBUTIONS OF AMERICAN INDIANS, HISPANIC AMERICANS, AFRICAN 27 AMERICANS, AND ASIAN AMERICANS. THE COMMISSION SHALL WORK

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COOPERATIVELY AND IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF
 EDUCATION AND LOCAL SCHOOL BOARDS OF EDUCATION AS DESCRIBED IN
 SECTION 22-1-104.

4 (2) ON OR BEFORE AUGUST 15, 2017, THE GOVERNOR SHALL 5 APPOINT, THROUGH THE OFFICE OF BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS, THE 6 MEMBERS OF THE COMMISSION AS SET FORTH IN THIS SUBSECTION (2). THE 7 COMMISSION CONSISTS OF FIFTEEN MEMBERS AND, TO THE EXTENT 8 PRACTICABLE, MUST INCLUDE PERSONS FROM THROUGHOUT THE STATE 9 AND PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES AND MUST REFLECT THE ETHNIC 10 DIVERSITY OF THE STATE. A MAJORITY OF THE COMMISSION MEMBERS 11 MUST HAVE EITHER CLASSROOM EXPERIENCE OR EXPERIENCE IN 12 DEVELOPING EDUCATION CONTENT STANDARDS. THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE 13 COMMISSION IS AS FOLLOWS:

14 (a) TWO MEMBERS FROM THE AMERICAN INDIAN COMMUNITY;

15 (b) TWO MEMBERS FROM THE LATINO COMMUNITY;

16 (c) TWO MEMBERS FROM THE AFRICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY;

17 (d) TWO MEMBERS FROM THE ASIAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY;

18 (e) ONE MEMBER WHO REPRESENTS AN EDUCATORS' UNION;

(f) ONE MEMBER FROM AN ORGANIZATION THAT REPRESENTS
EITHER SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENTS OR LOCAL SCHOOL BOARDS;

(g) Two MEMBERS REPRESENTING HIGHER EDUCATION. ONE
MEMBER MUST REPRESENT A LARGE STATE INSTITUTION OF HIGHER
EDUCATION, AND ONE MEMBER MUST REPRESENT A SMALLER STATE
INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION.

(h) Two members from the department of education, as
designated by the commissioner of education, who are nonvoting
MEMBERS; AND

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(i) THE PRESIDENT OF THE STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY,
 ESTABLISHED IN PART 2 OF ARTICLE 80 OF TITLE 24, OR HIS OR HER
 DESIGNEE, WHO IS A NONVOTING MEMBER.

4 (3) COMMISSION MEMBERS SERVE FOR TERMS OF FOUR YEARS; 5 EXCEPT THAT, OF THE MEMBERS FIRST APPOINTED, TWO MEMBERS 6 APPOINTED PURSUANT TO EACH OF SUBSECTIONS (2)(a), (2)(b), AND (2)(c)7 OF THIS SECTION AND ONE MEMBER APPOINTED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION 8 (2)(d) OF THIS SECTION, AS DESIGNATED BY THE APPOINTING OFFICIALS, 9 SERVE INITIAL TERMS OF TWO YEARS. THE APPOINTING OFFICIALS SHALL 10 FILL ANY VACANCIES ON THE COMMISSION FOR THE REMAINDER OF ANY 11 UNEXPIRED TERM.

(4) BEGINNING IN SEPTEMBER 2017, THE COMMISSION SHALL MEET
A MINIMUM OF TWO TIMES PER YEAR AND ADDITIONALLY AS NEEDED IN
CONJUNCTION WITH THE COMMUNITY FORUMS ESTABLISHED IN SECTION
22-1-104.

16 (5) COMMISSION MEMBERS SERVE WITHOUT COMPENSATION BUT
17 MAY BE REIMBURSED FOR ACTUAL AND REASONABLE EXPENSES INCURRED
18 IN THE PERFORMANCE OF THEIR DUTIES.

SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-7-1005, amend
(6) as follows:

21 22-7-1005. Preschool through elementary and secondary
22 education - aligned standards - adoption - revisions. (6) On or before
23 July 1, 2018, and on or before July 1 every six years thereafter, the state
24 board shall review and adopt any appropriate revisions to the preschool
25 through elementary and secondary education standards specified in this
26 section. In adopting revisions, the state board may add or delete one or
27 more of the specific instructional areas based on the needs of the state and

1 changes in national and international academic expectations. In adopting 2 revisions to the standards pursuant to this subsection (6), the state board 3 shall ensure that the standards continue to meet the requirements specified 4 in subsection (3) of this section. IN ADOPTING REVISIONS TO THE 5 STANDARDS RELATED TO HISTORY AND CIVICS, THE STATE BOARD SHALL 6 TAKE INTO CONSIDERATION ANY RECOMMENDATIONS PROVIDED BY THE 7 HISTORY, CULTURE, AND CIVIL GOVERNMENT IN EDUCATION COMMISSION 8 ESTABLISHED IN SECTION 22-1-104.3.

9 SECTION 4. Appropriation. For the 2017-18 state fiscal year,
10 \$37,495 is appropriated to the department of education. This
11 appropriation is from the general fund. To implement this act, the
12 department may use this appropriation for content specialists.

SECTION 5. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
