A BILL FOR AN ACT

101	CONCERNING THE CREATION OF THE INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL
102	GRANT PROGRAM, AND, IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, MAKING
103	AN APPROPRIATION.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill creates the interagency farm-to-school grant program (grant program), established by the department of education and administered by the interagency farm-to-school coordination task force (task force). The grant program is funded from the general fund and may award up to 2 types of grants as follows:

HOUSE Amended 2nd Reading April 21, 2015

- ! A cost-share grant to farmers, ranchers, or food hubs to be used for investments necessary to meet the food safety associated with sales to schools; and
- ! A grant to a farmer, rancher, or food hub for costs associated with sales to schools.

The bill requires the task force to issue guidelines as may be necessary for the implementation of the grant program.

The bill requires the task force to review the grant program and submit a report to the joint education committee in 2016, 2018, and 2019 regarding the effectiveness of the grant program.

The bill repeals the grant program after 5 years and establishes a sunset review.

5	PRODUCTS ARE PRODUCED, PACKED, HANDLED, AND STORED IN THE
6	SAFEST MANNER POSSIBLE TO MINIMIZE RISKS OF MICROBIAL FOOD SAFETY
7	HAZARDS. GAP/GHP AUDITS SHOULD ALSO VERIFY ADHERENCE TO THE
8	RECOMMENDATIONS MADE IN THE FEDERAL FOOD AND DRUG
9	ADMINISTRATION'S "GUIDANCE FOR INDUSTRY: GUIDE TO MINIMIZE
10	MICROBIAL FOOD SAFETY HAZARDS OF FRESH-CUT FRUITS AND

6	FOOD SAFETY PLANS, FOOD SAFETY CERTIFICATION, OR GAP/GHP AUDITS
7	TO ENABLE SALES TO SCHOOLS. INVESTMENTS INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT
8	LIMITED TO:
9	(I) TRAINING FOR MANAGERS, WORKERS, VOLUNTEERS, OR OTHERS
10	INVOLVED IN GROWING AND HANDLING FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL
11	PRODUCTS;
12	(II) EQUIPMENT FOR THE MONITORING OF THE ENVIRONMENT,
13	WATER, SOIL, OR SOIL AMENDMENTS FOR THE PRESENCE OF HUMAN
14	PATHOGENS OR INDICATOR ORGANISMS, INCLUDING ANY OTHER
15	ASSOCIATED COSTS;
16	(III) THE COST OF DISPOSABLE SUPPLIES REQUIRED AS A PART OF
17	ON-FARM FOOD SAFETY PLANS IN ORDER TO SELL FOOD AND
18	AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS TO SCHOOLS. SUCH DISPOSABLE SUPPLIES MAY
19	INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO, HAND WASHING SUPPLIES, CLEANING
20	SUPPLIES OR SANITIZERS, CONTAINERS, TOTES, PACKAGING MATERIALS,
21	TEMPERATURE CONTROL SUPPLIES, OR RODENT CONTROL SUPPLIES.
22	(IV) CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS MADE AS PART OF ON-FARM FOOD
23	SAFETY PLANS. SUCH CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS MAY INCLUDE, BUT ARE
24	NOT LIMITED TO, IMPROVEMENTS TO OR CONSTRUCTION OF HYGIENE
25	FACILITIES, INSTALLING SIGNAGE, BUILDING FENCES, MAKING NECESSARY
26	CHANGES TO WATER SOURCES OR DELIVERY SYSTEMS, OR PURCHASING
27	HARVESTING EQUIPMENT, PACKING EQUIPMENT, OR STORAGE OR COOLING

15	(6) THE TASK FORCE HAS THE AUTHORITY TO MAKE DECISIONS
16	REGARDING GRANT AWARDS AS PROVIDED IN THIS SECTION.
17	(7) The task force shall issue guidelines as may be
18	NECESSARY FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE GRANT PROGRAM. THE
19	GUIDELINES MUST INCLUDE, BUT NEED NOT BE LIMITED TO, THE TIME
20	FRAMES FOR SUBMITTING GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATIONS, THE FORM OF
21	THE GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATION, AND THE TIME FRAMES FOR THE
22	DISTRIBUTION OF GRANT MONEYS. THE TASK FORCE SHALL SEEK PUBLIC
23	COMMENT ON THE GUIDELINES IT ISSUES, WHICH PUBLIC COMMENT MAY BE

27	(8) AN ENTITY THAT SEEKS TO RECEIVE A GRANT PURSUANT TO

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1	THIS SECTION MUST SUBMIT AN APPLICATION TO THE TASK FORCE IN
2	ACCORDANCE WITH THE GUIDELINES ISSUED BY THE TASK FORCE AS
3	SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (7) OF THIS SECTION. AT A MINIMUM, THE
4	APPLICATION MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION:

16	SHALL SELECT APPLICANTS AND THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND
17	ENVIRONMENT SHALL AWARD GRANTS TO THE SELECTED APPLICANTS ON
18	OR BEFORE AUGUST 1 OF EACH YEAR OF THE GRANT PROGRAM.

3	SECTION 6. Appropriation. For the 2015-16 state fiscal year,
4	\$500,000 is appropriated to the department of public health and
5	environment for use by the prevention services division. This
6	appropriation is from the general fund and is based on an assumption that
7	the division will require an additional 0.5 FTE. To implement this act, the
8	division may use this appropriation for the interagency farm-to-school
9	grant program.
10	SECTION 7. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
11	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
12	preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.

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
