A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING THE EARLY CHILDHOOD LEADERSHIP COMMISSION.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at <u>http://leg.colorado.gov</u>.)

The bill amends the statutes relating to the early childhood leadership commission (commission) in the department of human services (department) as follows:

- ! Makes changes to the legislative declaration, mission, and duties of the commission to include consideration of families of pregnant women and children;
- ! Increases membership from 20 members to 25 members. Among other members described in the bill, the new

members may include representatives of programs providing early childhood services and supports for military families.

- ! Changes the title of the person appointed to assist the department in fulfilling the duties of the commission from "executive director" to "director";
- ! Removes the requirement that the director be compensated from money credited to the early childhood leadership commission fund;
- Permits the commission to seek, accept, and expend gifts, grants, and donations for the expenses of the commission;
- ! Allows general fund appropriations for the commission; and
- Extends the repeal date and sunset review of the commission prior to its repeal from 2018 to 2023.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

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SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.2-101, amend

3 (1)(a), (1)(c), (2)(a), (2)(b) introductory portion, and (3) as follows:

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26-6.2-101. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly

- 5 hereby finds that:
- 6 (a) Public investments for pregnant women and young children
 7 from birth to eight years of age AND THEIR FAMILIES fall behind
 8 investments for older Colorado children and lag behind national trends;

9 (c) While there are several planning efforts related to early 10 childhood services and collaborative bodies within state and local 11 governments, there is no single venue to allow high-level 12 decision-making among policy makers, to collectively study 13 recommendations, TO FACILITATE CROSS-AGENCY COLLABORATION 14 AMONG STATE AGENCIES, and to make joint policy and funding 15 recommendations.

16 (2) The general assembly further finds that:

(a) A commission to assist in coordinating services and supports

for pregnant women and young children from birth to eight years of age
 AND THEIR FAMILIES will improve the delivery of those services and
 improve the educational, health, emotional and mental health, child
 welfare, and employment outcomes for these children and their families;
 and

(b) A commission to assist in coordinating the delivery of services
and supports for pregnant women and young children AND THEIR
FAMILIES will also significantly improve Colorado's workforce and
economic development by:

(3) The general assembly finds, therefore, that it is essential to
create a high-level, interagency, public-private leadership commission to
identify opportunities for, and address barriers to, the coordination of
federal and state early childhood policies and procedures IN ORDER TO
PROMOTE ACCESS TO PROGRAMS AND SERVICES that affect the health and
well-being of Colorado's children.

SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.2-103, amend
(1), (2) introductory portion, (2)(d) introductory portion, (2)(d)(VI),
(2)(d)(VII), (5), and (6); and add (2)(d)(VIII) as follows:

19 26-6.2-103. Early childhood leadership commission - created 20 - mission. (1) There is created in the state department the early childhood 21 leadership commission. The purpose of the commission is to ensure and 22 advance a comprehensive service delivery system for pregnant women 23 and children from birth to eight years of age using data to improve 24 decision-making, alignment, and coordination among federally funded 25 and state-funded services and programs for pregnant women and young 26 children and their families. At a minimum, the comprehensive service 27 delivery system for pregnant women and children AND THEIR FAMILIES

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must include services in the areas of prenatal health, child health, child
 mental health, early learning CARE AND EDUCATION, and family support
 and parent education.

- 4 (2) The commission shall consist of up to twenty TWENTY-FIVE
 5 members as follows:
- 6 (d) No more than fourteen NINETEEN persons appointed by the
 7 governor, which persons collectively have the following expertise,
 8 affiliations, or backgrounds:

9 (VI) Members of the business community; and

(VII) Representatives of the local public health community; AND
 (VIII) REPRESENTATIVES OF PROGRAMS PROVIDING EARLY
 CHILDHOOD SERVICES AND SUPPORTS FOR MILITARY FAMILIES.

13 (5) The commission, in collaboration with the executive director 14 of the state department, may appoint an executive A director to assist the 15 commission in fulfilling its duties pursuant to this article ARTICLE 6.2. 16 The executive director may appoint such additional persons as may be 17 necessary to assist the commission. The executive director and any other 18 persons appointed pursuant to this subsection (5) shall be compensated 19 from moneys credited to the early childhood leadership commission fund 20 created in section 26-6.2-105.

(6) The governor's office, the state department, and the other
agencies represented on the commission may, at the request of the
commission and within existing appropriations, provide necessary support
to the commission, including but not limited to administrative support,
data, and other analytical information. In addition, the commission may
accept in-kind contributions SEEK, ACCEPT, AND EXPEND GIFTS, GRANTS,
OR DONATIONS from public and OR private entities SOURCES to the extent

1 necessary to cover the expenses of the commission.

2 SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.2-104, amend
3 (1) and (2)(b) as follows:

26-6.2-104. Early childhood leadership commission - duties.
(1) In addition to any other duties specified in law, the commission has
the following duties:

7 (a) To identify opportunities for, and barriers to, the alignment of 8 standards, rules, policies, and procedures across programs and agencies 9 that support young children and to recommend to the appropriate 10 committees of reference of the general assembly pursuant to part 2 of 11 article 7 of title 2 C.R.S., and to government and nonprofit agencies and 12 policy boards changes to enhance the alignment and provision of services 13 and supports for young children PREGNANT WOMEN AND YOUNG 14 CHILDREN AND THEIR FAMILIES;

(b) To advise and make recommendations to the state department
and to other relevant early childhood entities concerning implementation
of the early childhood Colorado framework;

(c) To assist public and private agencies in coordinating efforts on
behalf of pregnant women and children AND THEIR FAMILIES, including
securing funding and additional investments for services, and programs,
AND ACCESS TO THESE SERVICES AND PROGRAMS for children and their
families;

23 (d) To consider and recommend waivers from state regulations on
24 behalf of early childhood councils as provided in section 26-6.5-104 (1);

(e) To monitor the ongoing development, promotion, andimplementation of:

27 (I) A quality, cohesive professional development and career

- 1 advancement system;
- 2 (II) High-quality, comprehensive early learning standards; and
 3 (III) The sharing and use of common data for planning and
 4 accountability among early childhood programs;
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- (f) To develop strategies and monitor efforts concerning:
- (I) Increasing children's school readiness;
- 7 (g) (II) To develop strategies and monitor efforts concerning
 8 Increasing participation in and access to child care and early education
 9 programs; and
- 10 (h) (III) To develop strategies and monitor efforts concerning
 11 Promoting family and community engagement in children's EARLY
 12 education and development.
- 13 (2) In fulfilling its duties, the commission shall collaborate, at a14 minimum, with:
- (b) Any other boards, commissions, and councils existing within
 the executive branch agencies that address services and supports for
 PREGNANT WOMEN AND young children.
- 18 SECTION 4. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.2-105, amend
 19 (1) as follows:
- 20 26-6.2-105. Early childhood leadership commission fund -21 **created.** (1) There is created in the state treasury the early childhood 22 leadership commission fund, referred to in this section as the "fund". The 23 fund shall consist of such federal moneys as the governor may allocate 24 CONSISTS OF FEDERAL MONEY ALLOCATED to the fund BY THE GOVERNOR. 25 The fund shall not include appropriations of moneys from the state 26 general fund. The moneys MONEY in the fund are IS available to the 27 commission for administrative costs and the expenses incurred by the

1	commission in fulfilling its duties pursuant to this article ARTICLE 6.2.
2	THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY MAY ALSO APPROPRIATE GENERAL FUND MONEY
3	FOR ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS AND EXPENSES INCURRED BY THE

5	SECTION 5. In Colorado Revised Statutes, amend 26-6.2-106
6	as follows:
7	26-6.2-106. Repeal of article. This article ARTICLE 6.2 is
8	repealed, effective September 1, 2018. Prior to SEPTEMBER 1, 2023.
9	BEFORE its repeal, the commission is subject to review as provided in
10	ACCORDANCE WITH section 2-3-1203. C.R.S.
11	SECTION 6. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 2-3-1203, repeal
12	(6)(a)(IV); and add (14)(a)(V) as follows:
13	2-3-1203. Sunset review of advisory committees - legislative
14	declaration - definition - repeal. (6) (a) The following statutory
15	authorizations for the designated advisory committees will repeal on July
16	1, 2018:
17	(IV) The early childhood leadership commission created in section
18	26-6.2-103, C.R.S.;
19	(14) (a) The following statutory authorizations for the designated
20	advisory committees will ARE SCHEDULED FOR repeal on September 1,
21	2023:
22	(V) The early childhood leadership commission created in
23	SECTION 26-6.2-103.
24	SECTION 7. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act
25	takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the
26	ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly (August
27	9, 2017, if adjournment sine die is on May 10, 2017); except that, if a

referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in November 2018 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.
