A BILL FOR AN ACT

CONCERNING CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS AFFECTING CANDIDATES

SEEKING ACCESS TO THE BALLOT BY MEANS OF A PETITION, AND,

IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, ALTERING THE DEADLINES BY

WHICH CANDIDATE PETITIONS ARE REQUIRED TO BE FILED AND

INCREASING THE NUMBER OF SIGNATURES NEEDED TO QUALIFY

PETITIONS FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill extends the amount of time that elections officials may

review candidate petitions by making a concomitant reduction in the amount of time that candidates may circulate such petitions.

The bill also increases the number of signers needed to qualify petitions for candidates for certain partisan public offices.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado: 2 **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 1-4-801, amend (5) 3 as follows: 4 1-4-801. Designation of party candidates by petition. (5) Party 5 petitions shall not be circulated nor any signatures be obtained prior to the 6 first Monday in February. Petitions shall be filed no later than eighty-five 7 ONE HUNDRED days before the primary election. 8 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 1-4-802, amend 9 (1)(c) introductory portion, (1)(c)(IV), (1)(c)(V), and (1)(f) as follows: 10 1-4-802. Petitions for nominating minor political party and 11 unaffiliated candidates for a partisan office. (1) Candidates for 12 partisan public offices to be filled at a general or congressional vacancy 13 election who do not wish to affiliate with a major political party may be 14 nominated, other than by a primary election or a convention, in the following manner: 15 16 (c) Every petition for the office of president and vice president, 17 for statewide office, for congressional district office, for the office of 18 member of the general assembly, for district attorney, and for county 19 office shall MUST be signed by eligible electors residing within the district 20 or political subdivision in which the officer is to be elected. Except as 21 otherwise provided in subsection (2) of this section, the number of 22 signatures of eligible electors on a petition shall be IS as follows: 23 (IV) The lesser of six hundred ONE THOUSAND SIGNERS or two

14	(II) Petitions to nominate candidates of minor political parties
15	shall MUST be filed no later than eighty-five ONE HUNDRED days before
16	the primary election as specified in section 1-4-101.
17	SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 1-4-803, amend (2)
18	as follows:
19	1-4-803. Petitions for nominating school district directors.
20	(2) The nomination petition must be filed no later than sixty-seven
21	EIGHTY-ONE days before the election date.
22	SECTION 4. In Colorado Revised Statutes, amend 1-4-805 as
23	follows:
24	1-4-805. Petitions for nominating municipal candidates in
25	coordinated elections. Any person who desires to be a candidate for a
26	municipal office in a coordinated election shall, in lieu of the
27	requirements of this article ARTICLE 4, comply with the nominating

petition procedure set forth in the "Colorado Municipal Election Code of 1965", article 10 of title 31; C.R.S.; except that part 11 of this article ARTICLE 4, concerning write-in candidate affidavits, shall apply APPLIES in such municipal elections, and any nominating petition may be circulated and signed beginning on the ninety-first day prior to the election and shall be filed with the municipal clerk no later than the seventy-first EIGHTY-FIFTH day prior to the date of the election. The petition may be amended to correct or replace signatures that the clerk finds are not in apparent conformity with the requirements of the municipal election code at any time before the sixty-seventh day before the election.

SECTION 5. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly (August 9, 2017, if adjournment sine die is on May 10, 2017); except that, if a referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in November 2018 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.
