Bill Summary

The bill:

organizations, food banks, outreach providers, and local entities that provide employment services to community members;

- Modifies the eligibility criteria for receiving services and the list of reimbursable services under the program;
- Appropriates \$500,000 annually to the employment support and job retention services program cash fund (fund) and removes the requirement that the money be subject to annual appropriations and instead continuously appropriates the money in the fund;
- Repeals the current repeal date on the program and extends the program indefinitely; and
- Modifies the current reporting requirements to require the division of employment and training in the department of labor and employment to report on the efficacy of the program during the department's presentations at the "State Measurement for Accountable, Responsive, and Transparent (SMART) Government Act" hearings.
- 1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly

- 3 hereby finds and declares that:
- 4

(a) Employment support and job retention services are critical for

individuals pursuing skills and employment training to successfully attain
and retain an employment opportunity;

(b) The employment support and job retention services program
(program) has served as a lifeline for many Coloradans seeking
employment during the COVID-19 pandemic-induced economic
downturn and subsequent recovery, complementing the efforts of both the
state and federal governments to help the economy build back stronger
than it was before the pandemic;

(c) At an average cost of just over \$293 per eligible participant,
the program has served nearly 1,400 Colorado job seekers and newly
employed individuals pursuing an employment goal since its

1 implementation in January 2020;

2 (d) Ninety-three percent of service providers participating in the
3 program reported the program had a high, or extremely high, impact on
4 the long-term success of eligible participants, indicating administrative
5 efficacy and efficiency;

6 (e) With memorandums of understanding signed with service 7 providers representing 60 of Colorado's 64 counties, the program is truly 8 statewide and has helped both rural and urban Coloradans, women, 9 people of color, veterans, and others, and the modifications contained in 10 this legislation will enable the program to serve a broader range of 11 Coloradans, including those in marginalized communities;

(f) Because of the COVID-19 pandemic recovery efforts, demand
for the program is high, with funds expected to be exhausted in early
2022; and

(g) Reauthorization of the program beyond its scheduled repeal in
September 2022 is consistent with the state's goal of building back the
economy stronger than it was before by:

(I) Supporting all Coloradans by providing access to skills training
and credentialing to help them obtain economic security; and

20 (II) Helping businesses facing a uniquely challenging labor market
21 find the employees they need to thrive.

SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 8-83-401, amend (5)
as follows:

8-83-401. Definitions. As used in this part 4, unless the context
otherwise requires:

(5) "Service provider" means a public agency or nonprofit
 community organization that provides employment, employment

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preparation, EMPLOYMENT TRAINING, EDUCATION, and job retention
 services to eligible individuals pursuant to a memorandum of
 understanding with the administering entity. "SERVICE PROVIDER"
 INCLUDES FAITH-BASED ORGANIZATIONS AND CHURCHES, COMMUNITY
 CENTERS, NEIGHBORHOOD ORGANIZATIONS, FOOD BANKS, OUTREACH
 PROVIDERS, AND SIMILAR LOCAL ENTITIES THAT PROVIDE SERVICES TO
 MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY.

8 SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 8-83-404, amend
9 (1)(d), (4)(a), (5)(b) introductory portion, (5)(b)(I), (5)(b)(V), and
10 (5)(b)(XIII); and add (6) as follows:

11 8-83-404. Administration of the program. (1) The
12 administering entity shall:

13 (d) Ensure the fiscal responsibility of the program in compliance
14 CONJUNCTION with the director;

(4) Notwithstanding any other federal or state law, in order to be
eligible to receive services for which a service provider may be
reimbursed under the program, an individual must:

- 18 (a) (I) Have a household income at or below the federal poverty19 line; OR
- 20 (II) IF EMPLOYED:

21 (A) HAVE BEEN EMPLOYED FOR SIX MONTHS OR LESS BEFORE THE
22 DATE UPON WHICH ASSISTANCE IS REQUESTED; AND

(B) WITHIN NINETY DAYS BEFORE THE EMPLOYMENT START DATE,
HAVE HAD A HOUSEHOLD INCOME AT OR BELOW THE FEDERAL POVERTY
LINE.

26 (5) (b) Employment support, TRAINING, EDUCATION, and job
27 retention services that are eligible for reimbursement include:

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(I) COSTS RELATED TO transportation, or vehicle UPKEEP AND
 OPERATION, AND PARKING;

3 (V) Work tools and equipment, INCLUDING COMPUTERS, DIGITAL
4 DEVICES, AND COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH INTERNET CONNECTIVITY;

5 (XIII) Other expenses as they pertain to employment preparation,
6 job training, employment pursuit, EDUCATION, or job retention services
7 as determined by the director.

8 (6) NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER LAW TO THE CONTRARY, THE
9 SELECTION OF, AND PAYMENTS TO, SERVICE PROVIDERS FOR SERVICES
10 PURSUANT TO THE PROGRAM ARE NOT SUBJECT TO THE "PROCUREMENT
11 CODE", ARTICLES 101 TO 112 OF TITLE 24.

SECTION 4. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 8-83-405, amend (2)
as follows:

14 8-83-405. Reports required. (2) On or before December 1, 2021, 15 BEGINNING IN JANUARY 2023, the division shall report PROVIDE to the 16 business, labor, and technology committee of the senate and the business 17 affairs and labor committee of the house of representatives, or their 18 successor committees, a comprehensive analysis AN UPDATE concerning 19 the efficacy of the program DURING THE DEPARTMENT'S PRESENTATION AT 20 HEARINGS HELD PURSUANT TO THE "STATE MEASUREMENT FOR 21 ACCOUNTABLE, RESPONSIVE, AND TRANSPARENT (SMART) 22 GOVERNMENT ACT", PART 2 OF ARTICLE 7 OF TITLE 2.

23 SECTION 5. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 8-83-406, amend
24 (1)(a) and (3) as follows:

8-83-406. Employment support and job retention services
 program cash fund - created. (1) (a) The employment support and job
 retention services program cash fund, referred to in this section as the

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1	"fund", is hereby created in the state treasury. For the 2019-20 state fiscal
2	year, the general assembly shall appropriate seven hundred fifty thousand
3	dollars from the general fund to the fund. For THE $2022-23$ STATE FISCAL
4	YEAR AND EACH FISCAL YEAR THEREAFTER, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY
5	SHALL APPROPRIATE TWO HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS FROM THE
6	GENERAL FUND TO THE FUND. ANY MONEY REMAINING IN THE FUND AT
7	THE END OF A FISCAL YEAR REMAINS IN THE FUND AND DOES NOT REVERT
8	TO THE GENERAL FUND OR ANY OTHER FUND.
9	
10	(3) The division may use the money in the fund for the purposes
11	of this part 4, including administrative costs related to the program. The
12	administering entity may use money in the fund to operate the program.
13	The remainder of the money may be used only for reimbursements made
14	pursuant to section 8-83-404. The director or the director's designee may
15	expend money from the fund for the purposes of this part 4.
16	SECTION 6. In Colorado Revised Statutes, amend 8-83-407 as
17	follows:
18	8-83-407. Repeal of part. This part 4 is repealed, effective
19	September 30, 2022 SEPTEMBER 1, 2029.
20	SECTION 7. Appropriation. (1) For the 2022-23 state fiscal
21	year, \$250,000 is appropriated to the employment support and job
22	retention services program cash fund created in section 8-83-406 (1)(a),
23	C.R.S. This appropriation is from the general fund. The department of
24	labor and employment is responsible for the accounting related to this
25	appropriation.
26	(2) For the 2022-23 state fiscal year, \$250,000 is appropriated to

the department of labor and employment for use by the division of

employment and training. This appropriation is from reappropriated funds
in the employment support and job retention services program cash fund
under subsection (1) of this section. To implement this act, the
department may use the appropriation for employment support and job
retention services.
SECTION 8. Effective date. This act takes effect July 1, 2022.

SECTION 9. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
preservation of the public peace, health, or safety.
