The bill continues the Colorado resiliency office, which administers the resiliency and community recovery program as part of the state's disaster recovery and response functions. The requirement that the office be funded solely through grant funding is repealed, making general funds available to pay for the work of the office. The bill makes an

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado: 2 **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly 3 hereby finds and declares that: 4 (a) In response to floods affecting the state in 2013, the governor's 5 office created the Colorado resiliency and recovery office by executive 6 order to coordinate long-term recovery efforts, connect communities with 7 state and federal resources, and support communities to reduce the 8 impacts of future disasters. The office was later transferred to the 9 department of local affairs. The Colorado resiliency office is now integral 10 to long-term recovery in every disaster. 11 (b) In 2018, the general assembly created the office in statute, 12 renaming it the Colorado resiliency office, and codified core functions 13 related to long-term disaster recovery and rebuilding, with a focus on 14 resilience in preparation for future disasters. 15 (c) The Colorado resiliency office is currently funded solely 16 through grant funding, with no stable financial commitment to its 17 functions in disaster recovery. Its current funding through the disaster 18 emergency fund will expire on June 30, 2019, and will result in the 19 closure of the office. 20 (d) In the absence of general fund funding, the state will lose the 21 services the Colorado resiliency office provides in disasters, including 22 coordinating community and economic recovery efforts across multiple

agencies and supporting risk and vulnerability reduction efforts across
