HOUSE RESOLUTION 23-1005

101 **CONCERNING THE SEVENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ROUNDUP**
102 **RIDERS OF THE ROCKIES.**

1 WHEREAS, The Roundup Riders of the Rockies, also known as
2 3R, was founded in 1948 as a nonprofit organization dedicated to the
3 perpetuation of the western tradition associated with the relationship
4 between the American cowboy and his horse; and

5 WHEREAS, For seventy-five years, 3R has promoted the scenic
6 and tourist attractions of Colorado as members participate in an annual,
7 weeklong, 100-mile trail ride during the third week of July in a different
8 location each year; and

9 WHEREAS, The idea for this tradition first arose in 1948 while
10 founders Frank H. (Rick) Ricketson and Joe Dekker were returning home
11 to Colorado from California after a trek with the California Rancheros
12 Visitadores of Santa Barbara, California; and

13 WHEREAS, Rick and Joe both recognized the bountiful beauty to
14 be admired in the state of Colorado, found in the forest-laden hills, lakes,
15 streams, and fourteen-thousand-foot peaks, and decided to organize a

1 horseback ride through the forests near tourist centers; and

2 WHEREAS, As the story goes, the name of the organization, the
3 Roundup Riders of the Rockies, was born even before the two founders
4 settled their boots on Denver ground; and

5 WHEREAS, What began as an idea quickly grew into an
6 incorporated body: Preliminary meetings were held with similarly
7 civic-minded citizens; the articles of incorporation were filed on June 18,
8 1948; and Rick Ricketson was elected as president, Joe Dekker as vice
9 president, Al Gould as secretary, and L.W. Van Vleet as treasurer; and

10 WHEREAS, The first registration of riders took place on July 10,
11 1948, and eighteen members signed up for the inaugural trail ride during
12 the second week of July; and

13 WHEREAS, Growth after that first year was gradual but certain,
14 with membership limitations set at thirty-five members for future years,
15 allowing each of the riders the privilege of sponsoring a first-year guest,
16 known as a "Colt", for the ride; and

17 WHEREAS, The pinnacle event of each year is the 100-mile "Big
18 Ride", a challenging experience that emphasizes horsemanship,
19 sportsmanship, and camaraderie among warm and enduring friends; and

20 WHEREAS, Traversing roughly twenty miles per day is arduous,
21 and midway through the "Big Ride", the riders pause for a "layover day",
22 providing an opportunity for some to rest and for others to participate in
23 contests like trapshooting, a trail class, and a rodeo with games to
24 highlight the prowess of the riders and horses; and

25 WHEREAS, The week ends with all of the riders gathered at "Colt
26 Mountain", where the first-year recruits are officially inducted with a
27 deeply moving and heartfelt ceremony that concludes with the Colts
28 "catching the Spirit of the Ride"; and

29 WHEREAS, After seventy-three consecutive years of annual rides,
30 the 2020 "Big Ride" was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and
31 in 2021, the members were excited to be back in camp and enjoyed
32 renewing friendships in light of the separation caused by a trying year;
33 and

1 WHEREAS, Today, Roundup Riders of the Rockies members
2 come from fifteen different states ranging from Connecticut to California,
3 and this diverse group includes ranchers, farmers, businessmen,
4 physicians, law enforcement officers, retired members of the United
5 States forest service, attorneys, university professors, veterinarians,
6 military veterans, and other professionals; and

7 WHEREAS, A number of Colorado elected officials have had the
8 honor of participating in the "Big Ride", which elected officials include
9 individuals such as former Colorado Governor Richard Lamm and former
10 Representative Patrick Grant, while House Minority Leader,
11 Representative Mike Lynch, and Representative Richard Holtorf are
12 current members of 3R; and

13 WHEREAS, As a way to give back to their communities, 3R
14 members were instrumental in establishing the Citizen of the West
15 fundraiser, which fundraiser supports the National Western Scholarship
16 Trust that annually awards over eighty scholarships to undergraduate and
17 medical students from rural Colorado and Wyoming; and

18 WHEREAS, The Roundup Riders of the Rockies also founded the
19 Heritage and Trails Foundation, which organization helps provide
20 funding for trails and numerous equestrian-related projects throughout
21 Colorado for public enjoyment and use; and

22 WHEREAS, 3R is strongly dedicated to the promotion,
23 advancement, and prosperity of the state of Colorado and to the
24 preservation and utilization of our public lands and trails for the benefit
25 of all citizens; now, therefore,

26 *Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the*
27 *Seventy-fourth General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

28 That we, the members of the Colorado House of Representatives,
29 commemorate the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Roundup Riders of the
30 Rockies; recognize the horsemanship, sportsmanship, and dedication
31 required to be a member; and express gratitude to the riders for their
32 appreciation of Colorado's natural beauty and for their efforts to see all
33 citizens of Colorado benefitted by the preservation and utilization of
34 public lands.
