

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at <u>http://leg.colorado.gov</u>.)

The bill creates the crime prevention through safer streets grant program (grant program) in the department of public safety (DPS). The bill requires DPS to issue requests for proposals to local governmental agencies for the agencies to identify areas where crime is prevalent. After identifying such areas, local governmental agencies can apply to DPS for

grants for improvements designed to create safer streets.

The bill directs DPS to establish policies and procedures for the grant program. It also creates an advisory committee to review grant requests and make recommendations to the executive director of DPS. The executive director reviews responses to the requests for proposals and grants and determines which local governmental agencies will receive money and the amount of each grant.

The bill appropriates \$10.3 million to DPS for the grant program.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

2 SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 24-33.5-117 as
3 follows:

4 24-33.5-117. Crime prevention through safer streets grant 5 program - created - committee - reports - repeal. (1) THERE IS 6 CREATED IN THE DEPARTMENT THE CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH SAFER 7 STREETS GRANT PROGRAM, REFERRED TO IN THIS SECTION AS THE "GRANT 8 PROGRAM". THE GRANT PROGRAM ALLOWS THE DEPARTMENT AND LOCAL 9 GOVERNMENTS TO EVALUATE AND DESIGN SAFER STREETS AND 10 NEIGHBORHOOD MODELS THAT DISCOURAGE CRIME, REVITALIZE 11 COMMUNITY IMAGE, AND ESTABLISH PLACE-SPECIFIC CRIME PREVENTION 12 STRATEGIES THAT ACCOUNT FOR GEOGRAPHIC, CULTURAL, ECONOMIC, 13 AND SOCIAL CHARACTERISTICS OF THE TARGET AREAS. THE DEPARTMENT 14 SHALL ADMINISTER THE GRANT PROGRAM PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION. 15 THE DEPARTMENT SHALL FIRST ISSUE REQUESTS FOR PROPOSALS TO LOCAL 16 GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES FOR THE AGENCY TO OBTAIN AN ANALYSIS TO 17 IDENTIFY AREAS WHERE CRIME IS MORE PREVALENT. SUBJECT TO 18 AVAILABLE APPROPRIATIONS, THE DEPARTMENT MAY PROVIDE TECHNICAL 19 ASSISTANCE TO AGENCIES INTERESTED IN SUBMITTING RESPONSIVE 20 PROPOSALS. AFTER AREAS WHERE CRIME IS MORE PREVALENT ARE 21 IDENTIFIED, LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES MAY SUBMIT A GRANT

9 PRIOR TO SUBMITTING GRANT APPLICATIONS TO THE (4) 10 DEPARTMENT, LOCAL GOVERNMENT AGENCIES SHALL SOLICIT FEEDBACK 11 AND CONSULT WITH IMPACTED COMMUNITIES, INCLUDING BUT NOT 12 LIMITED TO AREA RESIDENTS AND BUSINESS OWNERS; HOMEOWNERS' 13 ASSOCIATIONS; REGISTERED NEIGHBORHOOD ORGANIZATIONS; AND 14 EXPERTS IN ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN, INCLUDING URBAN AND 15 TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROFESSIONALS AND ARCHITECTS WITH 16 RELEVANT EXPERIENCE IN ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN.

(5) THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SHALL:

18 (a) REVIEW RESPONSES TO REQUESTS FOR PROPOSALS TO IDENTIFY

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1	(6) (a) There is created in the department the crime
2	PREVENTION THROUGH SAFER STREETS ADVISORY COMMITTEE, REFERRED
3	TO IN THIS SECTION AS THE "COMMITTEE". THE COMMITTEE CONSISTS OF
4	THE FOLLOWING ELEVEN PERSONS, WHO ARE APPOINTED BY THE
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR:
6	(I) TWO MEMBERS OF LAW ENFORCEMENT;
7	(II) Two elected local officials, one from an urban
8	COMMUNITY AND ONE FROM A RURAL COMMUNITY;
9	(III) AN EXPERT IN SITUATIONAL CRIME PREVENTION;
10	(IV) THREE PERSONS FROM ORGANIZATIONS REPRESENTING
11	COMMUNITY INTERESTS;
12	(V) AN EXPERT WITH A BACKGROUND IN URBAN OR
13	TRANSPORTATION PLANNING;
14	(VI) AN ARCHITECT WITH EXPERIENCE IN ENVIRONMENTAL
15	DESIGN; AND
16	(VII) AN EXPERT IN EQUITY, DIVERSITY, AND INCLUSIVITY IN THE
17	LAW ENFORCEMENT OR PUBLIC SAFETY FIELD.
18	(b) Members of the committee serve without compensation
19	AND WITHOUT REIMBURSEMENT FOR EXPENSES.
20	(c) THE COMMITTEE SHALL REVIEW APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS
21	FOR SAFER STREETS AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE EXECUTIVE
22	DIRECTOR FOR WHICH GRANTS TO APPROVE AND THE AMOUNT OF EACH
23	grant. <u>In making its recommendations, the committee shall</u>
24	CONSIDER THE APPLICANT'S PLAN TO PREVENT:
25	(I) THE DISPLACEMENT OF HOMELESS POPULATIONS; AND
26	(II) HARM TO COMMUNITIES OF COLOR AND VULNERABLE
27	POPULATIONS.

(7) THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHALL APPROPRIATE TEN MILLION
 THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS IN FISCAL YEAR 2022-23 FROM THE
 GENERAL FUND FOR THE GRANT PROGRAM.

4 (8) ON OR BEFORE AUGUST 1, 2023, EACH LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL 5 AGENCY THAT RECEIVES A GRANT SHALL PROVIDE A FINAL REPORT TO THE 6 DEPARTMENT DESCRIBING HOW THE GRANT MONEY WAS UTILIZED AND 7 WHAT MEASURABLE OR OBSERVABLE IMPACTS THE USE OF THE GRANT 8 MONEY HAD ON REDUCING CRIME. ON OR BEFORE OCTOBER 1, 2023, THE 9 DEPARTMENT SHALL SUBMIT A SUMMARY OF THE REPORTS TO THE 10 JUDICIARY COMMITTEES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND SENATE, 11 OR TO ANY SUCCESSOR COMMITTEES.

12 (9) This section is repealed, effective November 1, 2023.

SECTION 2. Appropriation. For the 2022-23 state fiscal year,
 \$10,300,000 is appropriated to the department of public safety for use by
 the division of criminal justice. This appropriation is from the general
 fund and is based on an assumption that the department will require an
 additional 2.0 FTE. To implement this act, the department may use this
 appropriation for DCJ administrative services.
 SECTION <u>3.</u> Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,

determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
preservation of the public peace, health, or safety.
