Bill Summary

There is a sunrise review process for groups seeking peace officer status. The bill clarifies that municipalities do not need to go through that process to employ a police force.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

2 SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, amend 31-4-112 as
3 follows:

4 **31-4-112.** Marshal or chief of police - duties. The marshal or 5 chief of police shall execute and return, by himself OR HERSELF or by any 6 member of the police force, all writs and processes directed to him OR 7 HER by the municipal judge in any case arising under a city ordinance. In 8 criminal cases, quasi-criminal cases, or cases in violation of city 9 ordinances, he OR SHE may serve the same in any part of the county in 10 which such city is situate. The marshal, chief of police, or any member of 11 the police force shall suppress all riots, disturbances, and breaches of the 12 peace, shall apprehend all disorderly persons in the city, and shall pursue 13 and arrest any person fleeing from justice in any part of the state. He OR 14 SHE shall apprehend any person in the act of committing any offense 15 against the laws of the state or ordinances of the city and, forthwith and 16 without any warrant, bring such person before a municipal judge, county 17 judge, or other competent authority for examination and trial pursuant to 18 law. He OR SHE has, in the discharge of his OR HER proper duties, powers 19 and responsibilities similar to those which THAT sheriffs have in like 20 cases. THE MARSHAL OR CHIEF OF POLICE MAY EMPLOY CERTIFIED PEACE 21 OFFICERS TO ENFORCE ALL LAWS OF THE STATE OF COLORADO 22 NOTWITHSTANDING SECTION 16-2.5-201.

23 SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, amend 31-4-306 as
24 follows:

31-4-306. Marshal or chief of police - powers and duties. The
marshal or chief of police shall have HAS the same power that sheriffs
have by law, coextensive with the county in cases of violation of town

ordinances, for offenses committed within the limits of the town. He OR
SHE shall execute all writs and processes directed to him OR HER by the
municipal judge in any case arising under a town ordinance and receive
the same fees for his OR HER services that sheriffs are allowed in similar
cases. THE MARSHAL OR CHIEF OF POLICE MAY EMPLOY CERTIFIED PEACE
OFFICERS TO ENFORCE ALL LAWS OF THE STATE OF COLORADO
NOTWITHSTANDING SECTION 16-2.5-201.

8 SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 31-15-401, amend
9 (1)(a) as follows:

31-15-401. General police powers. (1) In relation to the general
 police power, the governing bodies of municipalities have the following
 powers:

(a) To regulate the police of the municipality, INCLUDING
EMPLOYING CERTIFIED PEACE OFFICERS TO ENFORCE ALL LAWS OF THE
STATE OF COLORADO NOTWITHSTANDING SECTION 16-2.5-201, and pass
and enforce all necessary police ordinances;

SECTION 4. Applicability. This act applies before, on, and after
the effective date of this act.

SECTION 5. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
