101	CONCERNING THE RESTORATION OF THE MONEY SPENT BY THE STATE
102	DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC FOR THE STATE'S
103	UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE PROGRAM.

### **Bill Summary**

#### The bill:

• Requires the state treasurer to transfer \$1.1 billion from the general fund to the unemployment compensation fund (fund) to restore the balance of the fund to the fund's pre-pandemic level; and

• Requires the director of the division of unemployment insurance to repay the federal government for \$1.014 billion of advances received from the federal government in responding to the COVID-19 pandemic.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado: 2 **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly 3 hereby finds and declares that: 4 (a) In January 2020, the balance of Colorado's unemployment 5 compensation fund (fund) was \$1.1 billion; 6 (b) Shutdowns ordered by the governor and local public health 7 officials during the COVID-19 pandemic led to record unemployment and 8 a rapid depletion of the entire fund; 9 According to the Colorado department of labor and 10 employment, between February and June of 2020, Colorado's jobless rate 11 increased from 2.5% to 10.5%, resulting in an increase of payments to 12 unemployed individuals from the fund; and 13 (d) The fund became insolvent on August 18, 2020. Colorado was 14 forced to borrow from the federal government in order to meet the 15 unemployment obligations and, as of January 7, 2022, owes \$1.014 16 billion on those loans. 17 (2) The general assembly recognizes that: 18 (a) Unemployment payments over the past two years have been a 19 lifeline to thousands of struggling Colorado families; 20 (b) Without the beginning balance in the fund, it would have been 21 impossible for the state to meet the needs of Colorado families; 22 (c) Putting the burden on employers to rebuild the fund will 23 actually delay the recovery and put Colorado companies at a

2	(d) It is incumbent upon the general assembly to use the
3	unexpected budget surplus in the general fund to repay the federal
4	advances and refill the unemployment compensation fund to the level it
5	was prior to the COVID-19 pandemic.
6	SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 8-77-101, add (3) as
7	follows:
8	8-77-101. Unemployment compensation fund - state treasurer
9	custodian. (3) On July 1,2022, the state treasurer shall transfer
10	ONE BILLION ONE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS FROM THE GENERAL FUND
11	TO THE UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION FUND FOR THE PURPOSE OF
12	RESTORING THE FUND BALANCE THAT WAS DEPLETED AS A RESULT OF THE
13	COVID-19 PANDEMIC AND THE GOVERNMENT'S RESPONSE TO THE
14	COVID-19 PANDEMIC.
15	SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 8-77-103, add (3) as
16	follows:
17	8-77-103. Advances from federal unemployment trust fund.
18	(3) On July 1, 2022, the director of the division shall repay the
19	FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ONE BILLION FOURTEEN MILLION DOLLARS FOR
20	FEDERAL ADVANCES RECEIVED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS
21	SECTION USED TO ASSIST INDIVIDUALS UNEMPLOYED AS A RESULT OF THE
22	COVID-19 PANDEMIC AND THE GOVERNMENT'S RESPONSE TO THE
23	COVID-19 PANDEMIC.
24	SECTION 4. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
25	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
26	preservation of the public peace, health, or safety.
