A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING FINANCIAL LITERACY STANDARDS FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at <u>http://leg.colorado.gov</u>.)

The bill directs the state board of education (state board) to review, during the first review of standards performed after July 1, 2021, standards relating to the knowledge and skills that a student should acquire in school to ensure that the financial literacy standards for ninth through twelfth grade include an understanding of the costs associated with obtaining a postsecondary degree or credential and how to budget for and manage the payment for those costs, including managing student loan debt; understanding credit cards and credit card debt; and

SENATE 2nd Reading Unamended March 10, 2020 understanding retirement plans, including investments and retirement benefits.

The bill adds to the resources contained in the existing financial literacy resource bank created and maintained by the state board specific references relating to assessing the affordability of higher education and how to budget and pay for higher education, as well as how to manage student loan debt; understanding credit cards and credit card debt; and understanding retirement plans, including investments and retirement benefits.

Under current law, school districts are encouraged to adopt a financial literacy curriculum and to make completion of a course in financial literacy a graduation requirement. The bill adds assessing the affordability of higher education and how to budget and pay for higher education, as well as how to manage student loan debt, to the suggested financial literacy curriculum, as well as familiarizing students with the process and required forms to apply for financial aid, grants, and scholarships.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

2 SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-7-1005, add (2.7)

3 as follows:

22-7-1005. Preschool through elementary and secondary
education - aligned standards - adoption - revisions. (2.7) DURING THE
FIRST REVIEW OF STANDARDS PERFORMED PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION
AFTER JULY 1, 2021, AND EVERY SIX YEARS THEREAFTER, THE STATE
BOARD SHALL ENSURE THAT THE NINTH THROUGH TWELFTH GRADE
FINANCIAL LITERACY STANDARDS INCLUDE AN UNDERSTANDING OF:

18 SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-2-127, amend (1)
19 as follows:

20 22-2-127. Financial literacy - resource bank - technical 21 assistance - definition. (1) As used in this section, "financial literacy" 22 means knowledge of personal finances that is sufficient to enable a person 23 to manage savings, investment, and checking accounts; to design and 24 maintain a household budget; TO ASSESS THE AFFORDABILITY OF AND TO 25 BUDGET FOR POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION; to manage personal debt, 26 INCLUDING STUDENT LOAN DEBT; to understand consumer credit and 27 finance; to manage personal credit options, and INCLUDING CREDIT

CARDS; to understand and select among short-term and long-term
 investment options; AND TO UNDERSTAND RETIREMENT PLANS,
 TAX-DEFERRED ACCOUNTS, PENSIONS, AND GOVERNMENT RETIREMENT
 BENEFITS.

5 SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-32-135, amend
6 (1)(e), (2), and (3) as follows:

7 22-32-135. Financial literacy curriculum - legislative
8 declaration - definition. (1) The general assembly hereby finds that:

9 (e) With the recent growth in consumer debt and the apparently 10 low level of education and understanding with regard to personal 11 finances, it is imperative that the public schools of the state provide 12 students with a thorough, high-quality curriculum of financial literacy to 13 enable students to understand and master personal finance skills, 14 including, at a minimum, managing bank accounts; household budgeting; 15 understanding and managing personal debt, INCLUDING CREDIT CARD 16 DEBT AND STUDENT LOAN DEBT; and managing personal savings, 17 RETIREMENT SAVINGS, and investment INVESTMENTS.

18 (2) As used in this section, "financial literacy" means knowledge 19 of personal finances that is sufficient to enable a person to manage 20 savings, investment, and checking accounts; to design and maintain a 21 household budget; TO ASSESS THE AFFORDABILITY OF AND HOW TO 22 BUDGET FOR POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION; to manage personal debt, 23 INCLUDING STUDENT LOAN DEBT; to understand consumer credit and 24 finance; to manage personal credit options, and INCLUDING CREDIT 25 CARDS; to understand and select among short-term and long-term 26 investment options; AND TO UNDERSTAND RETIREMENT PLANS, TAX-DEFERRED ACCOUNTS, PENSIONS, AND GOVERNMENT RETIREMENT 27

1 BENEFITS.

2 Each school district board of education is strongly (3) (a) 3 encouraged to adopt as part of its district curriculum courses pertaining 4 to financial literacy to be taught in grade-appropriate courses at the 5 elementary, middle, junior high, and high school grade levels. When 6 selecting mathematics and economics textbooks, each school district is 7 strongly encouraged to select those texts that include substantive 8 provisions on personal finance, including personal budgeting; credit; debt 9 management; STUDENT LOAN BORROWING; RETIREMENT, INCLUDING 10 LONG-TERM INVESTMENTS, TAX-DEFERRED ACCOUNTS, PENSIONS, AND 11 GOVERNMENT RETIREMENT BENEFITS; and similar personal finance topics. 12 (b) THE COURSES AND CURRICULUM DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION 13 (3)(a) OF THIS SECTION MUST ALSO INCLUDE CONTENT RELATING TO HOW 14 TO ASSESS THE AFFORDABILITY OF AND BUDGET FOR DIFFERENT OPTIONS 15 FOR OBTAINING A POSTSECONDARY DEGREE OR CREDENTIAL AND HOW TO 16 PAY FOR HIGHER EDUCATION. THE CURRICULUM SHOULD FAMILIARIZE 17 STUDENTS WITH THE PROCESS AND NECESSARY FORMS FOR APPLYING FOR 18 FEDERAL AND STATE FINANCIAL AID, STUDENT LOANS, SCHOLARSHIPS, AND 19 GRANT PROGRAMS AND SHOULD ENSURE THAT STUDENTS HAVE AN

20 AWARENESS OF STATE AND FEDERAL PROGRAMS THAT MAY BE AVAILABLE
21 TO MANAGE STUDENT LOAN DEBT.

SECTION 4. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly (August 5, 2020, if adjournment sine die is on May 6, 2020); except that, if a referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act

within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect
 unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in
 November 2020 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the
 official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.
