## "AN ACT CONCERNING IMMUNIZATIONS."

After the last section, add the following and renumber sections and
 internal references accordingly:

"Sec. 501. Subsection (a) of section 19a-7f of the general statutes is
repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from passage*):

6 (a) The Commissioner of Public Health shall determine the standard 7 of care for immunization for the children of this state. The standard of care for immunization shall be based on the recommended schedules 8 9 for active immunization for normal infants and children published by 10 the National Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Advisory 11 Committee on Immunization Practices, the American Academy of 12 Pediatrics and the American Academy of Family Physicians, provided, 13 on and after the effective date of this section, no revision to the standard 14 of care for immunization for the children of this state shall occur as a

15 result of the addition of an immunization against human 16 such recommended schedules papillomavirus to for active 17 immunization for normal infants and children without the approval of the General Assembly. The commissioner shall establish, within 18 19 available appropriations, an immunization program which shall: (1) 20 Provide vaccine at no cost to health care providers in Connecticut to 21 administer to children so that cost of vaccine will not be a barrier to age-22 appropriate vaccination in this state; (2) with the assistance of hospital 23 maternity programs, provide all parents in this state with the 24 recommended immunization schedule for normal infants and children, 25 a booklet to record immunizations at the time of the infant's discharge 26 from the hospital nursery and a list of sites where immunization may be 27 provided; (3) inform in a timely manner all health care providers of 28 changes in the recommended immunization schedule; (4) assist 29 hospitals, local health providers and local health departments to 30 develop and implement record-keeping and outreach programs to 31 identify and immunize those children who have fallen behind the 32 recommended immunization schedule or who lack access to regular 33 preventative health care and have the authority to gather such data as 34 may be needed to evaluate such efforts; (5) assist in the development of 35 a program to assess the vaccination status of children who are clients of 36 state and federal programs serving the health and welfare of children 37 and make provision for vaccination of those who are behind the 38 recommended immunization schedule; (6) access available state and 39 federal funds including, but not limited to, any funds available through 40 the federal Childhood Immunization Reauthorization or any funds 41 available through the Medicaid program; (7) solicit, receive and expend 42 funds from any public or private source; and (8) develop and make 43 available to parents and health care providers public health educational 44 materials about the benefits of timely immunization."

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:
