Substitute Bill No. 5363

AN ACT CONCERNING THE PLANNING COMMISSION FOR HIGHER EDUCATION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

Section 1. Section 10a-11b of the 2024 supplement to the general
 statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof
 (*Effective from passage*):

(a) There is established a Planning Commission for Higher Education
to develop and ensure the implementation of a higher education
strategic master plan in Connecticut.

7 (1) The commission shall consist of the following voting members: 8 (A) The president of the Connecticut State Colleges and Universities, the 9 president of The University of Connecticut, or their designees from the 10 Board of Regents for Higher Education and Board of Trustees; (B) the 11 provost of the Connecticut State Colleges and Universities and the 12 provost of The University of Connecticut; (C) the [chair] chairperson of 13 the Board of Regents for [the Connecticut State Colleges and 14 Universities] Higher Education, and the Board of Trustees for The 15 University of Connecticut, or the chairs' designees; (D) the president, 16 provost or chair of the board of a large independent institution of higher 17 education in the state, to be selected by the president pro tempore of the 18 Senate; (E) the president, provost or chair of the board of a small 19 independent institution of higher education in the state, to be selected

20 by the speaker of the House of Representatives; (F) a representative from 21 a private career school, to be selected by the executive director of the 22 Office of Higher Education; (G) a teaching faculty representative from 23 the Connecticut State [Universities] University System, to be selected by 24 the president of the Connecticut State Colleges and Universities; (H) a 25 teaching faculty representative from the regional community-technical 26 colleges, to be selected by the president of the Connecticut State Colleges 27 and Universities; (I) a teaching faculty representative from The 28 University of Connecticut, to be selected by the president of The University of Connecticut; (J) a teaching faculty representative from a 29 30 private career school in the state, to be selected by the executive director 31 of the Office of Higher Education; (K) one member appointed by the 32 president pro tempore of the Senate, who shall be a representative of a 33 large manufacturing employer in the state; (L) one member appointed 34 by the speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall be a 35 representative of a large financial or insurance services employer in the 36 state; (M) one member appointed by the majority leader of the Senate, 37 who shall be a representative of an information technology or digital 38 media employer in the state; (N) one member appointed by the minority 39 leader of the Senate, who shall be a representative of a small business 40 employer in the state; (O) one member appointed by the majority leader 41 of the House of Representatives, who shall be a representative of a 42 health care employer in the state; and (P) one member appointed by the 43 minority leader of the House of Representatives, who shall be a 44 representative of a small business employer in the state. The 45 commission membership shall, where feasible, reflect the state's 46 geographic, racial and ethnic diversity.

(2) The following persons shall serve as ex-officio nonvoting members on the commission: (A) The Commissioner of Education, the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development and the Labor Commissioner, or their designees; (B) a representative of an association of the state's independent institutions of higher education, appointed by the Governor; (C) a member of the State Board of Education, as designated by the chairperson of the state board; (D) the 54 superintendent of the technical high school system, or the 55 superintendent's designee; (E) the chief executive officer of Connecticut 56 Innovations, Incorporated, or the chief executive officer's designee; (F) 57 the executive director of the Office of Higher Education; (G) the 58 chairpersons and ranking members of the joint standing committee of 59 the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to higher 60 education and employment advancement; (H) the Secretary of the 61 Office of Policy and Management, or the secretary's designee; and (I) the 62 Chief Workforce Officer.

63 (3) All initial appointments to the commission shall be made not later 64 than June 1, 2024. The Governor shall appoint the chairperson from 65 among the commission's voting members. If an appointment under 66 subdivision (1) of this subsection is not made by said date, the 67 chairperson may designate an individual with the required qualification 68 stated for the applicable appointment to serve on the commission. Such 69 chairperson shall schedule the first meeting of the commission, which 70 shall be held not later than July 1, 2024. The commission shall elect a 71 vice-chairperson at its first meeting. Any vacancies shall be filled by the 72 appointing authority. The term of each appointed member of the 73 commission shall be three years from the date of appointment, except a 74 member shall continue to serve until such member's successor is 75 appointed. A majority of the commission shall constitute a quorum for 76 the transaction of business. The commission members shall serve 77 without compensation.

(<u>4</u>) The commission may (<u>A</u>) seek the advice and participation of any
person, organization or state or federal agency it deems necessary to
carry out the provisions of this section, [. The commission may,] (<u>B</u>)
within available appropriations, retain consultants to assist in carrying
out its duties, [. The commission may] <u>and (C)</u> receive funds from any
public or private sources to carry out its activities.

84 (5) The [commission shall be within the Office of Higher Education 85 and shall be responsible for implementing any policies developed by the 86 commission] <u>administrative staff of the joint standing committee of the</u> 87 <u>General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to higher</u>
88 <u>education and employment advancement shall serve as the</u>
89 <u>administrative staff of the commission</u>.

90 (b) The commission shall revise and update the higher education
91 strategic master plan adopted in 2015. Such <u>revised</u> strategic master
92 plan shall:

93 (1) Examine the impact of demographic, workforce and education94 trends on higher education in the state;

95 (2) (A) Assess progress toward the numerical goals established for 96 the years 2020 and 2025 under the strategic master plan adopted in 2015 97 and revise or establish numerical goals for the years [2025] 2026 and 98 2030 to (i) increase the number of people earning a bachelor's degree, 99 associate degree or certificate, (ii) increase the number of people 100 successfully completing coursework at the community college level and 101 the number of people entering the state's workforce, and (iii) eliminate 102 the postsecondary achievement gap between minority students and the 103 general student population, and (B) include specific strategies for 104 meeting such goals, as well as strategies for meeting the goals pursuant 105 to subsection (b) of section 10a-6 and section 10a-11c;

106 (3) Examine and recommend changes to funding policies, practices 107 and accountability in order to (A) align policies and practices with the 108 goals set forth in subsection (b) of section 10a-6 and section 10a-11c; (B) 109 determine how the constituent units shall annually report to the General 110 Assembly and the public in a transparent and thorough manner 111 regarding each constituent unit's expenditures, staffing and state 112 support, including the state appropriation, personnel expenses, 113 personnel fringe benefits, capital improvement bonds and financial aid 114 to students; and (C) improve coordination of appropriation, tuition and 115 financial aid and seek ways to maximize funding through federal and 116 private grants to accomplish state goals; and

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(4) Recommend ways in which each constituent unit of the state

system of higher education and independent institution of higher
education in the state can, in a manner consistent with such institution's
mission, expand such institution's role in advancing the state's economic
growth.

122 (c) In updating the higher education strategic master plan, the 123 commission shall review the plan developed pursuant to section 10a-6. 124 In addition, the commission may consider the following: (1) 125 Establishing incentives for institutional performance and productivity; 126 (2) increasing financial aid, especially in workforce shortage areas and 127 for minority and first-generation students; (3) expanding dual credit and career pathway opportunities in high schools and aligning such 128 129 opportunities with institutions of higher education; (4) promoting 130 partnerships with the business community and institutions of higher 131 education to expand work-based learning opportunities for students 132 and retraining and development opportunities for employees; (5) 133 establishing collaborative partnerships between public high schools, 134 community organizations and institutions of higher education to 135 expand college access for underserved and first-generation students; (6) 136 assessing and promoting programs in high school to assist high school 137 students seeking a college track or alternative pathways for post-138 secondary education, such as vocational and technical opportunities; (7) 139 developing policies to promote and measure retention and graduation 140 rates of students, including graduation rates for students who have 141 transferred among two or more constituent units or public institutions 142 of higher education; (8) developing policies to promote [Transfer] 143 transfer and [Articulation] articulation programs and the Connecticut 144 Automatic Admissions [program] Program state wide; (9) addressing 145 the educational needs of minority, underserved and first-generation 146 students and nontraditional students, including, but not limited to, part-147 time students, incumbent workers, adult learners, former inmates and 148 immigrants, in order to increase enrollment and retention in institutions 149 of higher education; (10) addressing the affordability of tuition at 150 institutions of higher education and the issue of increased student 151 indebtedness; and (11) developing policies to award credits for prior

152 learning and experience.

153 (d) Not later than September 1, [2024] <u>2025</u>, the commission shall 154 submit a preliminary report on the development of the update of the 155 higher education strategic master plan and, not later than December 1, 156 [2024] <u>2025</u>, the commission shall submit the higher education strategic 157 master plan, including specific goals and benchmarks for the years 158 ending [2025] 2026 and 2030, together with any recommendations for appropriate legislation and funding to the Governor and the joint 159 160 standing committees of the General Assembly having cognizance of 161 matters relating to higher education and employment advancement, 162 education, commerce, labor and appropriations and the budgets of state 163 agencies, in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a.

164 (e) Not later than January 1, [2026] 2027, and annually thereafter, the 165 commission shall submit a report to the Governor and the joint standing committees of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters 166 167 relating to higher education and employment advancement, education, 168 commerce, labor and appropriations and the budgets of state agencies, 169 in accordance with section 11-4a, on the implementation of the plan and 170 progress made toward achieving the goals specified in the plan. The 171 commission may periodically suggest changes to the goals as necessary.

172 (f) [Not later than January 1, 2018, for] For purposes of implementing 173 the higher education strategic master plan pursuant to subsection (b) of 174 this section, the commission [, in collaboration with the Office of Policy 175 and Management, shall establish two standing subcommittees and may 176 establish any working groups necessary to supplement the work of the 177 subcommittees or work. The chairperson and vice-chairperson of the 178 commission shall appoint the members of the standing subcommittees 179 and working groups, and may appoint members to such standing 180 subcommittees and working groups who are not members of the 181 commission.

(1) One standing subcommittee shall focus on data, metrics andaccountability, and build upon the work of the Preschool through 20

184 and Workforce Information Network in its measures and data. Such 185 measures shall be used to assess the progress of each public institution 186 of higher education toward meeting the commission's goals. The subcommittee shall collaborate with the Labor Department to (A) 187 188 produce periodic reports, capable of being sorted by student age, on the 189 employment status, job retention and earnings of students enrolled in 190 academic and noncredit vocational courses and programs, both prior to 191 enrollment and after completion of such courses and programs, who 192 leave the constituent units upon graduation or otherwise, and (B) 193 develop an annual affordability index for public higher education that 194 is based on state-wide median family income. The subcommittee shall submit annual reports to the commission and the constituent units. 195

(2) One standing subcommittee shall focus on the higher education
strategic master plan, analyzing the plans submitted since 2014 and
making recommendations to the commission on key areas. The
commission may recommend key areas of focus each year and require
the standing subcommittee to report to the commission on such key
areas.

(g) The commission may appoint advisory committees with representatives from public and independent institutions of higher education to study methods and proposals for coordinating efforts of the public institutions of higher education and the independent institutions of higher education to implement the goals identified in section 10a-11c.

(h) The commission may review its goals and plans and determine
how best to align its work with the work of the Higher Education
Innovation and Entrepreneurship Working Group and the Higher
Education Entrepreneurship Advisory Committee, established
pursuant to sections 32-39s and 32-39t.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:
