## AN ACT INCREASING THE PENALTIES ASSOCIATED WITH THE ISSUANCE OF A STOP WORK ORDER.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- 1 Section 1. Subsection (a) of section 31-69a of the general statutes is
- 2 repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (Effective October
- 3 1, 2020):
- 4 (a) In addition to the penalties provided in this chapter and chapter
- 5 568, any employer, officer, agent or other person who violates any
- 6 provision of this chapter, chapter 557 or subsection (g) of section 31-288
- 7 shall be liable to the Labor Department for a civil penalty of three
- 8 hundred dollars for each violation of said chapters and for each
- 9 violation of subsection (g) of section 31-288, except that (1) any person
- 10 who violates (A) a stop work order issued pursuant to subsection (c) of
- section 31-76a shall be liable to the Labor Department for a civil penalty
- of one thousand dollars and each <u>successive</u> day of such violation shall
- constitute a separate offense, the civil penalty of which shall increase at
- 14 the rate of five hundred dollars per day, commencing with the second
- 15 day of such violation, and (B) any provision of section 31-12, 31-13 or 31-

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- 16 14, subsection (a) of section 31-15 or section 31-18, 31-23 or 31-24 shall
- 17 be liable to the Labor Department for a civil penalty of six hundred
- 18 dollars for each violation of said sections, and (2) a violation of
- 19 subsection (g) of section 31-288 shall constitute a separate offense for
- 20 each day of such violation.
