## AN ACT LIMITING THE USE OF PERFLUOROALKYL AND POLYFLUOROALKYL SUBSTANCES IN CERTAIN PRODUCTS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- 1 Section 1. (NEW) (Effective July 1, 2019) (a) As used in this section
- 2 and section 2 of this act:
- 3 (1) "Perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances" mean a class of
- 4 fluorinated organic chemicals containing at least one fully fluorinated
- 5 carbon atom:
- 6 (2) "Food packaging" means a material that is intended for direct
- food contact and for single or limited use, including, but not limited to,
- 8 take-out containers and deli or bakery trays and wrappers; and
- 9 (3) "Reasonable alternative" means a product that has a similar use
- 10 and cost as the original product, but does not contain intentionally
- 11 added polyfluoroalkyl chemicals in any amount.
- 12 (b) The Department of Public Health shall examine the availability
- of reasonable alternatives to any food packaging product that contains
- 14 an intentionally added perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substance.

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Not later than January 1, 2020, the department shall report, in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the joint standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to public health on the results of such examination and a list of food packaging products that contain an intentionally added perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substance for

which a reasonable alternative is available.

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- (c) On and after January 1, 2021, no person may manufacture, knowingly sell, offer for sale, distribute for sale or distribute for use in the state food packaging that contains a perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substance that was intentionally added to such packaging in any amount when the department has determined, pursuant to subsection (b) of this section, that a reasonable alternative to such food packaging is available.
- 29 (d) The provisions of this section may be enforced, within available appropriations, by the Commissioner of Consumer Protection.
- Sec. 2. (NEW) (*Effective July 1, 2019*) (a) As used in this section, "class B firefighting foam" means a foam for the purpose of extinguishing flammable liquid fires.
  - (b) The Department of Public Health shall examine the availability of reasonable alternatives to any class B firefighting foam that contains an intentionally added perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substance. Not later than January 1, 2020, the department shall report, in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the joint standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to public health on the results of such examination.
  - (c) On and after July 1, 2020, (1) no person, local government or state agency may discharge or otherwise use for training purposes a class B firefighting foam that contains an intentionally added perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substance in any amount, and (2) a manufacturer of

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46 a class B firefighting foam may not manufacture, knowingly sell, offer 47 for sale, distribute for sale or distribute for use in the state a class B 48 firefighting foam that contains an intentionally added perfluoroalkyl 49 or polyfluoroalkyl substance in any amount, unless the addition of a 50 perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substance is necessary for the 51 purpose of complying with federal law, including, but not limited to, 52 the requirements set forth in 14 CFR 139.317, as amended from time to 53 time.

(d) The provisions of this section may be enforced, within available appropriations, by the Commissioner of Consumer Protection.
