Substitute Bill No. 6077

January Session, 2023



AN ACT ESTABLISHING A PROCESS FOR THE ADDITION OF DIVERSE STATUES TO THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING, A PLAN FOR SIGNAGE AROUND SAID BUILDING AND A STATE HISTORICAL COMMISSION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- Section 1. Section 4b-60 of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2023*):
- 3 (a) There shall be a State Commission on Capitol Preservation and 4 Restoration to consist of twelve members to be appointed as follows: 5 Two members shall be appointed by the Governor, two by the speaker 6 of the House of Representatives, two by the president pro tempore of the Senate, one by the House minority leader, one by the Senate 8 minority leader, two members of the Joint Committee on Legislative Management, one appointed by each of the chairmen of said committee, 10 and one member of the Historic Preservation Council appointed by its 11 chairperson. The Commissioner of Administrative Services, or the 12 commissioner's designee, shall be an ex-officio member of the 13 commission and shall attend its meetings. Vacancies on the commission 14 shall be filled by the original appointing authority for the unexpired 15 portion of the term. The members shall serve without compensation for 16 their services but shall be reimbursed for their actual and necessary 17 expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. The commission

- shall meet at least quarterly, and more often on the call of the chairman or on the written request of a majority of the members. The commission may designate subcommittees to carry out its functions. Any member who fails to attend three consecutive meetings or fails to attend fifty per cent of all meetings held during any calendar year shall be deemed to have resigned.
- 24 (b) The commission: (1) Shall undertake a continuing review and 25 study of the State Capitol building and grounds, with a view to 26 developing a master plan for the preservation and restoration of the 27 Capitol, including necessary structural changes, consistent with the 28 original historical character of the building, with due regard being given 29 to enhancing the interior and exterior beauty of the building, making 30 better use of existing space and reducing public safety hazards; (2) shall develop, as part of such master plan, a process for identifying and 31 32 commissioning additional statues to be added to the exterior of the State 33 Capitol building that reflect the diversity of the state; (3) may consult 34 with state, federal or private agencies with respect [thereto] to the duties 35 set forth in subdivisions (1) and (2) of this subsection, and disseminate 36 information on its activities; and [(3)] (4) shall report on its activities to 37 the Joint Committee on Legislative Management annually or as often as 38 the committee shall direct. The Department of Administrative Services 39 shall provide professional staff assistance to the commission when 40 available. If such assistance cannot be provided within a reasonable 41 time, the commission may, with the approval of the Joint Committee on 42 Legislative Management, retain technical advisors to assist in reviewing 43 project plans and work.
 - (c) The commission is authorized to accept gifts, donations and grants from the federal government or other public or private sources for the purpose of such preservation and restoration.
 - (d) The Joint Committee on Legislative Management may undertake capital expenditure programs for which capital funds are authorized, in connection with such preservation and restoration, including, but not limited to, implementing the process developed pursuant to subdivision

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- 51 (2) of subsection (b) of this section to commission additional statues.
- 52 Such programs shall be carried out by the committee, pursuant to plans
- 53 and specifications approved by the commission and in accordance with
- 54 the bidding procedures in part II of chapter 60. The commission shall
- 55 adopt regulations establishing basic artistic standards in keeping with
- 56 the original historical character of the Capitol to assist the committee in
- 57 the preparation of plans and specifications.
- 58 (e) The commission shall be an independent body within the 59 Legislative Department for administrative purposes only.
- 60 Sec. 2. (*Effective from passage*) Not later than February 1, 2024, the State
- 61 Commission on Capitol Preservation and Restoration shall (1) develop
- 62 a plan for the installation of exterior placards or other signage around
- 63 the exterior of the State Capitol Building to provide a written historical
- 64 explanation of the various statues and other markers on the exterior of
- 65 the State Capitol Building for the public, and (2) submit such plan to the
- 66 Joint Committee on Legislative Management.
- 67 Sec. 3. (NEW) (Effective July 1, 2023) (a) There is established a State
- 68 Historical Commission, which shall be an independent body within the
- 69 Legislative Department for administrative purposes only. The
- 70 commission shall examine and make recommendations to the
- 71 legislative, executive and judicial branches on questions
- 72 memorialization and commemoration related to Connecticut and
- 73 United States history.
- 74 (b) The commission shall consist of the following members: (1) Two
- 75 appointed by the speaker of the House of Representatives; (2) two
- 76 appointed by the president pro tempore of the Senate; (3) one appointed
- 77 by the minority leader of the House of Representatives; (4) one
- 78 appointed by the minority leader of the Senate; (5) two appointed by the
- 79 Governor; (6) two appointed by the chairpersons of the joint standing
- 80 committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters
- 81 relating to government administration, with one member appointed by

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each chairperson; and (7) two appointed by the ranking members of the

- joint standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to government administration, with one member appointed by each ranking member. Members shall be scholars in the areas of history, literature, law or philosophy with an affiliation with an accredited institution of higher education located in this state. Any member of the commission appointed under this subsection may be a member of the General Assembly.
- (c) All initial appointments to the commission shall be made not later than September 1, 2023. Appointed members of the commission shall serve for three-year terms which shall commence on the date of appointment. Members shall continue to serve until their successors are appointed.
 - (d) The speaker of the House of Representatives and the president pro tempore of the Senate shall select the chairperson of the commission from among the members of the commission. Such chairperson shall schedule the first meeting of the commission, which shall be held not later than September 15, 2023.
- 100 (e) The administrative staff of the joint standing committee of the 101 General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to government 102 administration shall serve as administrative staff of the commission.
- 103 (f) Any vacancy shall be filled by the appointing authority. Any vacancy occurring other than by expiration of term shall be filled for the balance of the unexpired term.
- 106 (g) A majority of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business.
- (h) The members of the commission shall serve without compensation, but shall, within the limits of available funds, be reimbursed for expenses necessarily incurred in the performance of their duties.
- (i) The commission shall have the following powers and duties: To

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(1) issue reports and recommendations to all three branches of government concerning historical questions of memorialization and commemoration related to Connecticut and United States history, either upon the request of any executive, legislative or judicial department, board, commission or other agency of the state or upon its own initiative; (2) obtain from any executive, legislative or judicial department, board, commission or other agency of the state such assistance and data as necessary and available to carry out the purposes of this section; (3) accept any gift, donation or bequest for the purpose of performing the duties described in this section; and (4) perform such other acts as may be necessary and appropriate to carry out the duties described in this section.

(j) Not later than February 1, 2024, and annually thereafter, the commission shall submit a report, in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the Governor and the joint standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to government administration. Such report shall include, but need not be limited to, a summary of the activities of the commission during the prior year and any policy changes and amendments to the general statutes necessary to implement the recommendations of the commission.
