AN ACT CONCERNING A STUDY OF LONG-TERM CARE NEEDS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- 1 Section 1. (Effective from passage) (a) The Commissioner of Social
- 2 Services, in consultation with the Commissioner of Aging and
- 3 Disability Services, shall conduct a study of the state's long-term care
- 4 needs.

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- 5 (b) The study shall include, but need not be limited to: (1) For
 - calendar year 2022, the number of state residents age sixty and older;
- 7 (2) for calendar year 2026, the projected number of state residents age
- 8 sixty and older; (3) for calendar year 2022, the number of state
- 9 residents age sixty and older and adults under sixty years of age with
- disabilities who required long-term care; (4) for calendar year 2026, the
- 11 projected number of state residents age sixty and older and adults
- 12 under sixty years of age with disabilities who will require long-term
- care; (5) for calendar years 2018 to 2022, inclusive, the number of
- 14 residents removed from institutionalized settings to home and
- 15 community-based settings under the Money Follows the Person
- 16 demonstration project established pursuant to section 17b-369 of the

- general statutes; and (6) for calendar years 2018 to 2022, inclusive, the savings in state expenditures on long-term care related to the Money Follows the Person demonstration project.
- 20 (c) Not later than July 1, 2024, the Con

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(c) Not later than July 1, 2024, the Commissioner of Social Services, in consultation with the Commissioner of Aging and Disability Services, shall report the results of the study, in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the joint standing committees of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to aging and human services. Such report shall include the commissioner's recommendations for addressing identified gaps in the provision of long-term care and resources needed for future long-term care needs.
