## AN ACT CONCERNING THE USE OF MOBILE TELEPHONES BY EMERGENCY PERSONNEL.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- 1 Section 1. Subsection (b) of section 14-296aa of the general statutes is
- 2 repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (Effective from
- 3 passage):
- 4 (b) (1) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection and
- 5 subsections (c) and (d) of this section, no person shall operate a motor
- 6 vehicle upon a highway, as defined in section 14-1, while using a hand-
- 7 held mobile telephone to engage in a call or while using a mobile
- 8 electronic device. An operator of a motor vehicle who types, sends or
- 9 reads a text message with a hand-held mobile telephone or mobile
- 10 electronic device while operating a motor vehicle shall be in violation of
- 11 this section, except that if such operator is driving a commercial motor
- vehicle, as defined in section 14-1, such operator shall be charged with
- a violation of subsection (e) of this section.
- 14 (2) An operator of a motor vehicle who holds a hand-held mobile
- 15 telephone to, or in the immediate proximity of, his or her ear while

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- 16 operating a motor vehicle is presumed to be engaging in a call within 17 the meaning of this section. The presumption established by this 18 subdivision is rebuttable by evidence tending to show that the operator 19 was not engaged in a call.
- 20 (3) The provisions of this subsection shall not be construed as 21 authorizing the seizure or forfeiture of a hand-held mobile telephone or 22 a mobile electronic device, unless otherwise provided by law.
- 23 (4) Subdivision (1) of this subsection shall not apply to: (A) The use 24 of a hand-held mobile telephone for the sole purpose of communicating 25 with any of the following regarding an emergency situation: An 26 emergency response operator; a hospital, physician's office or health 27 clinic; an ambulance company; a fire department; or a police 28 department, [or (B) any of the following persons while in the 29 performance of their official duties and within the scope of their 30 employment: A peace officer, as defined in subdivision (9) of section 53a-3, a firefighter or an operator of an ambulance or authorized 32 emergency vehicle, as defined in section 14-1, or a member of the armed 33 forces of the United States, as defined in section 27-103, while operating 34 a military vehicle, or (C)] (B) the use of a hand-held radio by a person 35 with an amateur radio station license issued by the Federal 36 Communications Commission in emergency situations for emergency 37 purposes only, or [(D)] (C) the use of a hands-free mobile telephone.

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Sec. 2. (NEW) (Effective from passage) No member of the Division of State Police within the Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection, authorized pursuant to subdivision (2) of subsection (a) of section 5-246 of the general statutes to provide police services for a private contractor at a highway construction site, shall use a mobile telephone, as defined in subsection (a) of section 14-296aa of the general statutes, while providing such police services, except such member may use a mobile telephone if such member's radio to allow real-time communication with an emergency response operator, a police department or the Division of State Police is inoperative.

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This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

## Statement of Purpose:

To prohibit (1) emergency personnel from using a hand-held mobile telephone when operating a motor vehicle upon a highway, and (2) a state police officer from using a mobile telephone when providing police services for private contractors at highway construction sites.
