## AN ACT ESTABLISHING A COMPREHENSIVE COMMUNITY SCHOOLS PILOT PROGRAM.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. (*Effective July 1, 2019*) (a) As used in this section:

2 (1) "Community school" has the same meaning as provided in 3 section 10-74i of the general statutes;

4 (2) "Lead partner agency" means a nonprofit organization that 5 partners with school personnel to manage and lead the work of 6 developing and sustaining a community school; and

7 (3) "Community partner" has the same meaning as provided in8 section 10-74i of the general statutes; and

9 (b) For the fiscal years ending June 30, 2020, and June 30, 2021, the 10 Department of Education shall administer a comprehensive 11 community schools pilot program that awards grants for the planning 12 and implementation of a new community school or the expansion of 13 an existing community school. The department shall annually award 14 (1) sustainable community school start-up grants in an amount not to exceed fifty thousand dollars per grant awarded to not more than four applicants, and (2) sustainable community school implementation grants in an amount not to exceed one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars per grant awarded to not more than four applicants, provided no more than two such implementation grants are awarded to an applicant located in an educational reform district, as defined in section 10-262u of the general statutes.

22 (c) (1) Prior to submitting an application under this subsection, an 23 applicant shall establish a community school planning and oversight 24 team that is responsible for developing school-specific programming 25 goals, assessing program needs and, if applicable, overseeing the 26 process of implementing expanded programming. Such team shall be 27 composed of at least twelve, but not more than eighteen, members as 28 follows: (A) At least four of whom are parents or guardians of students 29 who would be served by the proposed community school, (B) at least 30 four of whom are teachers at the proposed community school, (C) the 31 principal at the proposed community school, or the principal's 32 designee, (D) representatives from community partners who would 33 provide services at the proposed community school, and (E) 34 representatives from civic or parent-teacher organizations selected by 35 the local or regional board of education that such board believes 36 represents the best interests of students and public education.

37 (2) Any local or regional board of education for a town designated 38 as an alliance district, as defined in section 10-262u of the general 39 statutes and a lead partner agency may submit an application for a 40 sustainable community school start-up grant. An application 41 submitted under this subsection shall include evidence of support 42 from (A) the local or regional board of education, (B) a lead partner 43 agency, and (C) the parents or guardians of students who would be 44 served by the community school.

(d) (1) Prior to submitting an application under this subsection, an
applicant shall establish a community school planning and oversight
team, as described in subdivision (1) of subsection (c) of this section,

48 and a school leadership team that is responsible for continually 49 monitoring the development and implementation of a community 50 school. The community school planning and oversight team and the 51 school leadership team shall collaborate with the lead partner agency 52 and school personnel at the community school to (A) conduct a 53 baseline analysis of students' instructional and service needs within 54 the school and the community, (B) provide for the coordinated 55 delivery of instructional programming and services to students, and 56 (C) address the ongoing responsiveness of the comprehensive 57 community school pilot program. The school leadership team shall be 58 composed of at least twelve, but not more than fifteen, members as 59 follows: (i) The principal at the community school, or the principal's 60 designee, (ii) parents or guardians of students who would be served by 61 the community school, (iii) teachers and other school personnel 62 providing direct services to students at the community school, (iv) 63 representatives from community partners who would provide services 64 at the community school, (v) in the case of a community school at a 65 high school, at least one who is a student enrolled at such school, and 66 (vi) at least two of whom are representatives from the neighborhoods 67 served by such school.

68 (2) Any local or regional board of education for a town designated 69 as an alliance district, as defined in section 10-262u of the general 70 statutes and a lead partner agency may submit an application for a 71 sustainable community school implementation grant. An application 72 submitted under this subsection shall include (A) a community school 73 plan, as described in section 10-74i of the general statutes, (B) evidence 74 of support from the local or regional board of education and a lead 75 partner agency, and that the support from such lead partner agency is 76 for a period of at least five years, (C) the creation of a position, or 77 designation of an existing employee, at the school to be the community 78 schools coordinator that will be integrated with the office of the school 79 principal, (D) strategies that coordinate and integrate services 80 provided to students and their families by family resource centers, 81 established pursuant to section 10-40 of the general statutes, (E) a

82 sustainable funding plan for the community school, including the costs 83 and benefits of service coordination, sources of charitable revenue and 84 in-kind services and the feasibility of using funding received pursuant to Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, 20 USC 6301 85 86 et seq., as an on-going funding source, (F) evidence of sustained 87 parental engagement in the planning, implementation and planned 88 operation of the community school, (G) strategies for ensuring a 89 continuum of early childhood education opportunities, if the school 90 offers kindergarten, (H) evidence of support and commitment from the 91 exclusive bargaining unit for certified employees chosen pursuant to 92 section 10-153b of the general statutes, (I) a description of the structure 93 and composition of the community school planning and oversight 94 team, established pursuant to subdivision (1) of this subsection, and (J) 95 a description of the school leadership team, established pursuant to 96 subdivision (1) of this section.

97 (e) On or before August 15, 2020, and August 15, 2021, the 98 Department of Education shall conduct an evaluation of the 99 comprehensive community school pilot program. Such evaluation 100 shall address (1) the overall effectiveness of the pilot program at each 101 community school based on measures of student engagement, student 102 academic achievement, parental engagement and noninstructional 103 services provided to students and their families, (2) any changes in the 104 number or percentage of students and nonstudents receiving services 105 at the community school, and the nature of such change, (3) any local 106 budget savings resulting from implementation of the community 107 school, (4) the nature and breadth of revenue sources utilized in the 108 provision of services through the community school, (5) the degree of 109 community stakeholder and institutional partner engagement, (6) any 110 increases in access to community services for students and their 111 families as a result of the community school, (7) any increased 112 collaboration between participating agencies and private partners, and 113 (8) any lessons learned regarding strategies to improve the future 114 delivery of community school services to students and their families. 115 The department shall submit such evaluation and any

recommendations for legislation to the joint standing committee of the
General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to education,
children and human services, in accordance with the provisions of
section 11-4a of the general statutes.

120 Sec. 2. (NEW) (Effective July 1, 2019) (a) There is established the 121 Connecticut Community Schools Consortium. The consortium shall 122 serve as a network of local and regional boards of education and 123 community partners participating in the operation of a community 124 school, pursuant to section 10-74i of the general statutes or section 1 of 125 this act, to share best practices, address common issues or problems, 126 coordinate services and resources and seek collaboration across school 127 districts. The consortium shall meet at least quarterly.

(b) The consortium shall be administered by a steering committee.
The steering committee shall determine the operations and
participants of the consortium. The steering committee shall consist of:

131 (1) The Commissioner of Education, or the commissioner's designee;

(2) Two representatives from the American Federation of TeachersConnecticut, one of whom is an active community school participant
or a certified educator;

(3) Two representatives from the Connecticut Education
Association, one of whom is an active community school participant or
a certified educator;

(4) An administrator from a community school or a school in which
a community school is being planned, selected by the Connecticut
Association of School Administrators;

(5) An administrator from a community school or a school in which
a community school is being planned, selected by the Connecticut
Federation of School Administrators; and

144 (6) A superintendent from a school district in which a community

school is located or a community school is being planned, selected bythe Connecticut Association of Public School Superintendents.

147 (c) The steering committee shall be convened by the Commissioner 148 of Education, or the commissioner's designee, not later than September 149 15, 2019. The commissioner, or the commissioner's designee, shall 150 select two chairpersons from among the membership of the steering 151 committee. The steering committee may invite additional participants 152 to join the consortium, including, but not limited to, state and national 153 experts, representatives from charitable organizations, local or regional 154 service providers, mental health providers and regional chambers of 155 commerce or business entities with an interest in a local community 156 school initiative.

(d) On or before January 1, 2021, and annually thereafter, the
steering committee shall submit a report concerning the consortium's
activities for the previous year to the joint standing committee of the
General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to education,
in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general
statutes.

(e) The Connecticut Community Schools Consortium shall be withinthe Department of Education for administrative purposes only.
