AN ACT CONCERNING UTILITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE PUBLIC UTILITIES REGULATORY AUTHORITY.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. Subsections (a) to (c), inclusive, of section 16-2 of the 2 general statutes are repealed and the following is substituted in lieu 3 thereof (*Effective October 1, 2023*):

4 (a) There shall continue to be a Public Utilities Regulatory Authority 5 within the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, which 6 shall [consist of five electors of this state] be under the direction of three 7 utility commissioners, appointed by the Governor with the advice and 8 consent of both houses of the General Assembly. Not more than [three] 9 two members of said authority in office at any one time shall be 10 members of any one political party. [The Governor shall appoint five 11 members to the authority.] The procedure prescribed in section 4-7 shall 12 apply to such appointments, except that the Governor shall submit each 13 nomination on or before May first, and both houses shall confirm or 14 reject it before adjournment sine die. Any utility commissioner 15 appointed by the Governor and confirmed by both chambers of the

16 General Assembly between February 1, 2019, and June 1, 2019, shall 17 serve a term expiring on March 1, 2024. Any utility commissioner 18 appointed by the Governor and confirmed by both houses of the 19 General Assembly between February 1, 2018, and June 1, 2018, shall 20 serve a term expiring on March 1, 2022. [Between July 1, 2019, and May 21 1, 2020, the Governor shall appoint three utility commissioners, 22 provided one such commissioner shall serve a term expiring on March 23 1, 2021, and two such commissioners shall serve terms expiring on 24 March 1, 2023.] Any utility commissioner appointed on or after May 1, 25 2020, shall serve a term of four years. <u>No utility commissioner appointed</u> 26 on or after February 1, 2023, may serve more than two such four-year 27 terms. All utility commissioners shall be electors of the state. The utility 28 commissioners shall be sworn to the faithful performance of their duties.

(b) [The authority shall elect] <u>Each June, the utility commissioners</u>
<u>shall choose, from among them,</u> a chairperson and vice-chairperson,
[each June] <u>who shall serve</u> for one-year terms starting on July first of
the same year. The vice-chairperson shall perform the duties of the
chairperson in his or her absence.

34 (c) Any matter coming before the authority may be assigned by the 35 chairperson to a panel of [three] one or more utility commissioners. 36 Except as otherwise provided by statute or regulation, the panel shall 37 determine whether a public hearing shall be held on the matter, and 38 may designate one or [more] two of its members to conduct such 39 hearing or may assign a hearing officer to ascertain the facts and report 40 thereon to the panel. The decision of the panel, if unanimous, shall be 41 the decision of the authority. If the decision of the panel is not 42 unanimous, the matter shall be approved by a majority vote of the utility 43 commissioners.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

Statement of Purpose:

To limit the number of Public Utilities Regulatory Authority commissioners to three and to establish a term limit of two four-year terms for such commissioners.
