A BILL IN THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA To amend, on a temporary basis, the Health Services Planning Program Re-Establishment Act of 1996 to set forth the maximum fee for filing a certificate of need application by a federally qualified health center for projects located in Wards 7 and 8. BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this act may be cited as the "Federally Qualified Health Center Certificate of Need Maximum Fee Establishment Temporary Act of 2017." Sec. 2. Section 21 of the Health Services Planning Program Re-Establishment Act of 1996, effective April 9, 1997 (D.C. Law 11-191; D.C. Official Code § 44-420), is amended by adding a new subsection (c) to read as follows: "(c)(1) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) of this section, the maximum application fee that may be collected from a federally qualified health center shall be \$5,000 for any project located in Wards 7 and 8.". "(2) For the purposes of this subsection, the term "federally qualified health center" shall have the same meaning as provided in section 1905(1)(2)(B) of the Social Security Act, approved August 14, 1935 (79 Stat. 351; 42 U.S.C. § 1396d(1)(2)(B)).".
