McDuffie A BILL IN THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA To amend, on an emergency basis, due to congressional review, the Legalization of Marijuana for Medical Treatment Initiative of 1999 to set a new expiration date for qualifying patient and caregiver registration identification cards from 2 years to 6 years and to require the surrender of a registration card and notification of any registered caregiver when a person no longer requires medical cannabis; and to amend Title 47 of the District of Columbia Official Code to establish the 4/20 Medical Cannabis Sales Tax Holiday Week for 2024. BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this act may be cited as the "Medical Cannabis Patient Card Extension and 4/20 Medical Cannabis Sales Tax Holiday Week Congressional Review Emergency Amendment Act of 2024". Sec. 2. The Legalization of Marijuana for Medical Treatment Initiative of 1999, effective February 25, 2010 (D.C. Law 13-315; D.C. Official Code § 7-1671.01 et seq.), is amended as follows: (a) Section 5 (D.C. Official Code § 7-1671.04) is amended by adding a new subsection (e) to read as follows: "(e)(1) Within 14 calendar days of receiving a notice as described in paragraph (2) of this subsection, a qualifying patient shall: "(A) Surrender his or her registration card to the Board; and

36	"(B) Notify his or her registered caregiver, if applicable, of the change
37	described in the notice.
38	"(2) For the purposes of this subsection, "notice" means:
39	"(A) An authorized practitioner declaring that:
40	(i) The qualifying patient no longer suffers from a qualifying medical
41	or dental condition; or
42	(ii) The authorized practitioner no longer recommends use of medical
43	cannabis for a qualifying medical or dental treatment for the qualifying patient; or
44	"(B) A qualifying patient notifying ABCA that they no longer need cannabis for the

47	(b) Section 6(b)(5) (D.C. Official Code § 7-1671.05(b)(5)) is amended as follows:

50	entities registered pursuant to paragraph (1)(A) of this subsection, such cards expire every 6
51	years;".
52	(2) Subparagraph (C) is amended to read as follows:
53	"(C) The ABC Board may, by rule, establish license and registration periods
54	and fees under the section that are valid for one year, 2 years, or 3 years, except for registration
55	identification cards for qualifying patients and caregivers registered pursuant to paragraph (1)(A) of
56	this subsection, and temporary non-resident registration identification cards that are valid for
57	periods established by the ABC Board by rulemaking, which shall be between 3 days and no longer
58	than one year in length.".
