Dr. Angela Marie Grice, PhD, CCC-SLP, is the owner of The Dialogue Group, a multi-faceted company based in Washington, D.C., that provides innovative solutions to various communication dilemmas in diverse settings. Dr. Grice is a native Washingtonian and adjunct clinical professor at Howard University.

In 2004, she was selected as a Minority Post-Doctoral Fellow at Teacher's College. She joined the Department of Biobehavioral Sciences and then continued her fellowship in the Neurocognition of Language Lab.

Her research interests are comprised of traumatic brain injury; executive functions; and delivery of services among culturally linguistically diverse

populations. Working primarily with individuals in urban populations led to research on the impact of socioeconomic factors on service delivery. Currently, Dr. Grice is working on developing a curriculum that focuses on teaching executive functional skills to adolescents. In addition, she will focus on research that demonstrates the efficacy of mindfulness-based principles on the management of cognitive communication difficulties.

A Ward 4 resident, Dr. Grice earned her Bachelor of Arts in Speech Pathology from George Washington University, and both her Master of Science and Doctorate in Speech Language Pathology from Howard University.
