895 financial audits of any non-state agency for which funds are appropriated in this Act. During the fiscal year, the Joint
896 Finance Chairs and the Office of the Controller General shall conduct random, in depth assessments of agencies
897 outlined in Section 2 of this Act. Said assessments shall include, but not be limited to, a review of the agency's
898 performance measures, program evaluation metrics, site visits, and meetings with agency Executive Directors and
899 Board of Directors.

900 Section 8. Funds appropriated in this Act shall not be used by any agency to provide child day care. It is the
901 intent of the General Assembly that no funds will be appropriated in grants-in-aid to agencies for the purchase of capital
902 equipment, relocation, rehabilitation, renovation or purchase of buildings.

903 Organizations will not be eligible for consideration of a grant-in-aid appropriation unless they have been
904 incorporated and operating for a two-year period prior to June 30th of the fiscal year in which they apply for funding for
905 the following fiscal year.

906 Section 9. 29 Del. C. §6505(d) provides that monies appropriated for Grants-in-Aid in each Fiscal Year shall
907 be paid in quarterly installments. For Fiscal Year-such payments shall be paid in 4 equal installments, 1 each in July,
908 October, January and April. Upon notification by the Chairman of the Joint Finance Committee, the State Treasurer
909 shall be directed to withhold such installment payment(s). An installment payment may be delayed or withheld if the
910 grant-in-aid recipient:

- 911 (a) Has not submitted a quarterly statement of expenditures if required to do so;
- 912 (b) Expended funds from the grant-in-aid for purposes not intended by the General Assembly;
- 913 (c) Expended funds for day care, purchase of capital equipment, relocation, renovation, rehabilitation or
914 purchase of buildings;
- 915 (d) Owes Unemployment Insurance Taxes or Workers Compensation Taxes to the Department of Labor;
- 916 (e)

917 Failure to pay Corporation Franchise Tax;;

918 (f) Agency is no longer in operation;

919 (g) In the case of a senior center closing during the fiscal year, any remaining quarterly payments will be
920 retained in the Office of the Controller General. Disbursements from this account shall be made in consultation
921 with the University of Delaware and with the approval of the co-chairs of the Joint Finance Committee.

922 Section 10. (a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that each Grant-in-Aid recipient shall submit one of the
923 following with its application for a grant award in Fiscal Year:

924 (i) The most recent copy of the agency's audit completed by either a Certified Public Accountant or
925 a Public Accountant. The audit must have been issued within the past three years; or

926 (ii) If the agency is not able to provide an audit, the agency must submit a detailed statement of the
927 circumstances surrounding the reason. The lack of an audit may impact the ultimate funding decision of
928 the Joint Finance Committee.

929 (b) Fire companies listed in this Act shall submit financial information on the form approved by the State
930 Treasurer, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and the Controller General. The listed fire companies are
931 exempt from the provisions of Subsection (a) of this Section. Financial forms will be submitted to the State Fire School
932 and they will be responsible for forwarding copies of the forms to the Office of the Controller General.

933 (c) Recipients of the appropriations for Aid to Local Law Enforcement shall be exempt from the provisions of this
934 Section.

935 (d) Non-compliance by a Grant-in-Aid recipient with the provisions of this Section shall automatically disqualify
936 the applicant for consideration of a Grant-in-Aid award in Fiscal Year ~~2018~~ 2019.

937 Section 11. It is the intent of the Joint Finance Committee to review all Grant-in-Aid applications and give
938 consideration to the diversity of an agency's revenues; including the percentage of revenues that are from the State via pass
939 thrus, agency grants, or contracts. The Joint Finance Committee will also consider the percentage of an agency's budget
940 that is allocated to salaries and benefits.

941 Section 12. The sums appropriated to the various Senior Centers in Section 1 of this Act shall be made
942 available to the Division of Services for Aging and Adults with Physical Disabilities in order to meet the State's
943 matching requirement for federal funds appropriated under the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended. Those senior
944 centers receiving funds under the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended, shall present to the Division of Services
945 for Aging and Adults with Physical Disabilities a proposal for expenditure of State funds. The proposal submitted to
946 the Division of Services for Aging and Adults with Physical Disabilities shall be prepared in accordance with the
947 guidelines established for the administration of programs under the Older Americans Act. To be considered for
948 funding, a senior center must meet the criteria established in Section 5. Funding will be determined by the Joint

949 Finance Committee based upon its evaluation and with advice from the University of Delaware Institute for Public
950 Administration.

951 Section 13. Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Department of Health & Social Services, Public
952 Health, Emergency Medical Services (35-05-30), for the state component of the operational costs associated with each
953 county's paramedic service for Advanced Life Support. These funds shall be disbursed by Emergency Medical Services on
954 a quarterly basis to counties that operate approved programs.

955 Emergency Medical Services shall have an audit performed by the State Auditor annually to insure that
956 reimbursement to the counties for the State share of costs was for approved Advanced Life Support Services. Adjustments
957 shall be made to the final quarterly reimbursement based on the audit results.

958 Section 14. Appropriations made in Section 1 of this Act to Emergency Medical Services and Aid to Local Law
959 Enforcement shall not be subject to the provisions in Sections 8, 9 and 10. Funds appropriated to Aid to Local Law
960 Enforcement shall not be subject to reversion at the end of the fiscal year if unexpended or unencumbered, but shall be
961 continued for a period of up to three years.

962 Section 15. (a) The funds appropriated in Section 1 for the Department of Safety and Homeland Security - Aid to
963 Local Law Enforcement and EIDE shall be allocated according to the formula presently used by the SALLE Committee as
964 revised from time to time. Expenditures from this fund must be approved by the Budget Director and the Controller
965 General.

966 (b) Local law enforcement agencies may combine their allocations, upon approval of the SALLE
967 Committee, to support a pool arrangement to fund a contiguous area served by more than one local law enforcement
968 agency.

969 (c) Each local law enforcement agency contracting for an allocation shall, not later than April 1, 2017
970 report in detail the plan under which such funds are being expended, and any other information requested by the SALLE
971 Committee. The SALLE Committee shall report to the General Assembly of the State of Delaware on or before May 1,
972 2017 as to the agencies that were awarded grants from these funds, the amount of the grant, and the purpose of the grant.

973 (d) Copies of the minutes of all regular meetings and any special meetings of the SALLE Committee
974 shall be forwarded in a timely manner to the Office of the Controller General.

975 Section 16. Section 1 of this Act appropriates funds to Aid to Local Law Enforcement and EIDE. These funds
976 shall be distributed based on (a) \$3,000 to each police agency; (b) any funds in excess of "(a)" based on the ratio of the
977 number of police officers each police agency has to the total number of police in all agencies.

978 Section 17. (a) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the
979 appropriation in Section 2 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of the Fiscal Year 2017 for the agencies as
980 follows:

982 August Quarterly
983 Camp Barnes
984 Delaware Academy of Science - Iron Hill Museum
985 Delaware Association for Blind Athletes
986 New Castle Separation Day
987 Delaware City Day Committee
988 New Castle Historical Society

989 (b) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the appropriation in
990 Section 1 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of each Fiscal Year for the municipalities which receive \$6,000 or
991 less from the line item Aid to Local Law Enforcement.

992 (c) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the appropriation to
993 any Grant-in-Aid recipient receiving an amount of \$6,000 or less listed in Section 2 of this Act at the beginning of the first
994 quarter of each Fiscal Year.

995 (d) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the appropriation to the
996 fire companies listed in Section 3 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of each Fiscal Year.

997 (e) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the appropriation to
998 organizations funded on a one-time basis in Section 1 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of each Fiscal Year.

999 Section 18. Section 2 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Delaware State Fair. Of that amount, \$121,614
1000 shall be used for prizes for achievements in agriculture, animal raising and in works of manual training and the domestic
1001 arts to be awarded at the annual State Fair and \$5,000 shall be used for purses on Governor's Day which shall be paid by
1002 the State Treasurer at the beginning of the first quarter of each Fiscal Year. The remainder of the appropriation shall be
1003 paid in quarterly allotments, as provided in Chapter 65, §6505 of Title 29, Delaware Code.

1004 Section 19. The appropriation in Section 2 of this Act to Camp Barnes, Inc. shall be used for the purpose of
1005 maintaining and operating Camp Barnes for the recreation of deserving youths from throughout the State.

1006 Section 20. Section 2 of this Act appropriates funds to the Delaware State Police Museum, Inc. These funds may
1007 not be used for capital/construction costs.
